## HALDIMAND PLOWMEN ORGANIZE BRANCH

At a very well attended meeting, held in the Court House, Cayuga, on Friday evening, July 19th, it was decided to organize a Haldimand Branch of the Ontario Plowmen's Association. Enthusiasm ran high and those present signified their support in a very real way and a complete organization was formed. Mr. Frank Laidlaw acted as chairman and in a few well-chosen words called attention to the objects of a Plowmen's Association and threw the matter open to discussion. It was decided that a plowing match be held and the date set was the last Thursday in October. Consideration was given to the encouragement of Junior Plowing Classes and the Secretary was instructed to secure the services of Mr. McLean, if possible, to assist junior members in adjusting plows and preparation for a competition. A Grounds Committee, composed of the President, 1st and 2nd Vice-President and J. F. Martindale, was appointed to secure a suitable location for a match this fall. Further announcements will be made later, regarding their findings.

## CANFIELD WINS BURNS CHALLENGE TROPHY

Successful Household Science Judging Competition — Entries for C. N. E. Competition

In a very close competition, the Canfield team carried away the honors in the Girls' Household Science Judging Competition, held in the Town Hall, Cayuga, on Friday, July 19th. The team was composed of Miss Helen Haney, Miss Nellie Campbell and Miss Doris Topp and they secured 1543 points out of a total of 1800 points. Miss Helen Haney also had the honor of being the high girl of the competition with a total score of 536 out of 600 points.

The following paper was delivered by Mrs. Earle Stallwood:

## WHAT IT IS TO BE A CANADIAN

What's in a Name? We are all proud of the name "Canada," yet how many of us are acquainted with its origin? No less than five derivations for the word "Canada" have been suggested. First, from the Algonquin word "Canata," meaning "welcome," supposed to have been used by the Indians when they first saw Cartier, whom they received with demonstrations of joy. Second, from the Iroquois word, "Canatha," meaning "a collection of huts," and being the word the Algonquins applied to their chief town. Third, from a Spanish word, "Acánada," meaning, "there is nothing there," indicating that the Spaniards saw no signs of gold as they skirted the coast of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Fourth, from a Portuguese word, "Canada," meaning "a narrow passage," probably meaning the St. Lawrence. Fifth, Coriers says the word is Basque for "canal," which would convey the same idea as "canal or narrow passage." The name Canada was used by the early French explorers and settlers. It is interesting to note that historians generally accept the Iroquois, "collection of huts," as its derivation.

As we look back upon the rise of this New World, our greatest admiration is aroused. How different is our land from the short time that it was inhabited by Indians. What do we see today in this broad expanse of wilderness? Pass from Annapolis to the Bay of Fundy, and the great trees of New Brunswick (Continued on Page 4)

## THE OLD AGE PENSION REQUIREMENTS

The requirements and many of the points in connection with the Old Age Pension scheme, which are now announced, are very enlightening. In brief, the pension is granted only to British subjects over 70 years of age, who have resided in Canada for 20 years and in Ontario for five years. The maximum pension is \$240 yearly, which shall be subject to reduction by the amount of the income of the pensioner in excess of \$124 a year. Where a man and wife can both qualify, each is entitled to a pension. There are numerous other provisions which directly affect the application for a pension. For instance, under the Ontario Parson's Maintenance Act, a son or daughter having sufficient means is bound to provide for the maintenance of a dependent parent. The Old Age Pension Act will not relieve a son or daughter from this obligation where a pensioner is the owner of a house or other dwelling house in which he resides, and the Old Age Pension Commission of Ontario acts as a transfer to it of such interest, the pension is not subject to any reduction in respect thereof, but the Commission, on the death of a pensioner or upon his ceasing to occupy such dwelling house may sell such interest and retain out of the proceeds the amount of all payments made by the pensioner in excess of the amount he would have received if such interest had not been transferred to the Commission. Numerous other requirements are added which make the Act very broad in its scope and strict in its application.
