Good Roads Committee Report

Was adopted as follows:

We have examined the pay lists and accounts submitted by the superintendent for the month of April, and recommend that they be paid.

Would recommend that the following used road machinery at county shed, Hagersville, be offered for sale by public auction:

1 Case steam tractor, 25 h.p.

1 Case rock crusher, size of opening 10x20 inches.

1 6-h.p. gas engine with hoisting attachment.

1 Stone bin and screen (in Schwegler quarry near Cheapside).

2 Medium side stone bins.

20 Spreading wagons, capacity 2 1/2 tons each.

1 Heavy grader, with scarifying attachment.

6 Traction cars, capacity 4 tons each.

Quantity of small tools.

Would recommend that the quotation from Alfred Best be accepted for supplying and delivering crushed stone and screenings on Roads No. 7, 8, 11 and 12, price \$2.40 per yard estimated amount of crushed stone and screenings on above roads 10,000 tons, more or less).

Would recommend that sealed tenders be asked for, for supplying and delivering stone and screenings, up to 12 o'clock noon, May 27th, 1929 on the remaining county roads, as per schedule attached herewith.

Would recommend that sealed tenders be asked for up till June 6th, 1929, for constructing the following reinforced concrete bridges and culverts, on Roads No. 4, 6, 3, 11, 12 and 17, more particularly described in the schedule attached herewith.

Would recommend that Isaac Hubbard be appointed foreman on Road 12 from Rainham Road to Fisherville;

W. R. Nixon be appointed foreman on Road No. 4 and Road No. 12 from Hagersville to Fisherville; Harry Lachen be appointed foreman on Road No. 1 from Provincial Highway No. 3 to Lincoln County Line, and on Road No. 15 from Provincial Highway No. 3 to Welland County Line;

Marshall Lindsay be appointed foreman on Road No. 11 from Norfolk County Line to Selkirk; and appointments of foremen on Road No. 16 from Road No. 9 to York, and on Road No. 5 from York Bridge to Indian Line be made later.

Would recommend that the Superintendent be instructed to place warning signs at the intersection of roads that are heavily travelled, and at any other points along the highways that are considered dangerous so as to as far as possible avoid accidents.

The Superintendent has been instructed to have the River Road put in good repair as soon as possible.

Would recommend that sealed tenders be asked for surface treatment, for or asphalt, on Road 12 from Hagersville to Nelles Corners, up to noon, June 6th, as per plans and specifications in Superintendent's office.

The Council placed on record its deep appreciation of the very valuable suggestions and advice so generously and willingly given to the Good Roads Committee by J. M. McInnes, Provincial Engineer.

A bylaw was passed appropriating \$29,000 for construction and \$100,000 for maintenance on the County highways during the year 1929.
