Helen McGregor, of Winnipeg, "The Flying Pianist" whose "flying fingers" earned her unofficial title, and Myrtle Cook, whose flying heels won her the official title of Amateur Lady Champion of the World at the Olympic Meet last year, take a lesson in navigation from Captain Dott of the Canadian Pacific liner "Montrose."

Miss Cook, who now covers women's sports for the Montreal Star is not unfamiliar with the air, having flown the English Channel on several occasions when on the other side at athletic events. Miss McGregor is one of the few women familiar with the controls of trimotored planes. She travelled west as a passenger in the Junkers plane which was landed at Montreal from the Canadian Pacific freighter "Beaverbrae" for the Western Canada Airways, Limited, by whom it will be used in air mail and express services.

VETERINARY NEWS

A Remedy Worth Knowing to Farmers

In a paper, not long ago, I read a piece of a complaint of a sow eating her newly born pigs and the advice to kill the animal as it was a habit that one could not cure the animal of—not so. This is a fault which is very often done, but which can be stopped. This habit can be easily prevented. A few days before the birth of the little ones, say two or three days before, give the sow a

piece of old salt pork two or three inches square to eat. It is a craving for salt. This will stop all desire for eating her young. We always did it and found it effective every time. If not done before birth and if you find one pig missing, do so, it will keep her from eating the others. Then give her light soft diet with plenty of water. It is a fever in the blood which oftentimes upsets a brooding sow, especially if irritable and rooting straw or earth before the birth of the young. Pigs will not eat salt like a horse or cow, but is something in the diet they should get occasionally. C. Erwin.
