HEALTH HINTS

Muscular twitching, acute nephritis (this is inflammation of the kidney) occur in the third week and sometimes sooner. Note on your chart all observations as they occur. This is necessary, even to a joint being inflamed, as rheumatism and heart weakness, if the kidneys are affected. Milk is an ideal food, it may be peptonized, if necessary. If the fever is very high, give from three to five ounces of fluid every hour. The diet should be liquid for two weeks or until the temperature is normal. A drink, as cool lemonade, orangeade albumin, should be given frequently. During convalescence give junket oatmeal, soft boiled rice, custard milk and cream toast, stale bread, jellies, stewed fruit. The doctor will prescribe the solution for spraying of the throat, etc. Be careful a patient does not cough in your face, this may give you infection.

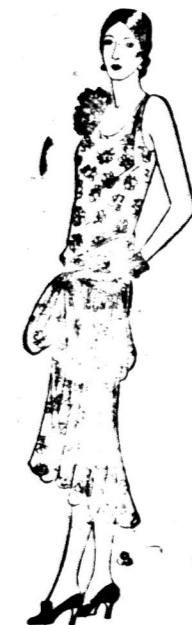
WHOOPEE DAYS
