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IT MIGHT HAVE BEEN A VERY SERIOUS OUTBREAK

Maple Leaf, June 14
Sunday forenoon Howard Guiler was giving a motorboat an overhauing and had thrown the drainings from the tank and the oil which had accumulated in the bilge of the boat, fortunately, was still above the water on the crosspieces where it had been placed for the winter period of inactivity overboard. A spectator lighted a cigarette and thoughtlessly threw the match on the gasoline and oil covered surface of the water beneath the boat. Mr. Guiler heard unusual hissing sounds and began to feel decidedly warmer than he had been a few moments before. Glancing up from his work on the machinery at the bottom of the boat and looking over the side the workman was greeted by the beginnings of a smart little fire which would soon have destroyed that particular boathouse and two adjacent ones with their contents. Himself a former volunteer fireman, Mr. Guiler ran to his auto, jumped in and sped away for the firebell, the ringing of which soon brought enough firemen to warrant a speedy return to the scene of the incipient conflagration which had in the meantime practically burned itself out without doing much damage beyond scorching the paint of the craft, which owing to its elevated position, did not receive the full force of the flames.

It was fortunate that high water had prevailed a few days before and so thoroughly soaked the boathouse timbers and lumber that they resisted the action of the fire. The members of the department who missed the truck on its speedy departure were also soon on the scene by means of other conveyances to find that their services were not required except to assist in loading a long line of hose which had been laid to quell the fire should it have attacked the buildings.

C. & B. LINE OPENS NEW DIVISION

On Saturday, June 29th, The Cleveland and Buffalo Transit Company inaugurates its new division between Port Stanley and Cleveland, Ohio.

The famous steamer "City of Erie" will make daily trips between these two ports, leaving Port Stanley at 4 p.m., arriving at Cleveland at 9:30 p.m. On the return trip she leaves Cleveland at 12 midnight, arriving in Port Stanley at 6 a.m. This schedule is based on Eastern Standard Time.

It is expected that this route will prove exceedingly popular with the auto tourists this summer," says Mr. T. F. Newman, President of the Cleveland and Buffalo Transit Company, "as it saves them many miles of tedious driving over congested roadways." The distance across Lake Erie by steamer is only 87 miles and is the shortest route into Ohio from Ontario Province.

Combining the facilities of the Cleveland-Port Stanley, Canada Division with the Cleveland-Buffalo Division, the C. & B.
