Game Goes to 6th Overtime

TEAMS SO EVENLY MATCHED THAT NO VERDICT WAS SECURED

The meeting of the Jarvis and Waterford hockey teams on Tuesday night in Port Dover on Friday night was productive of an exciting game of the Canadian national variety. Both teams seemed to have an ace—several of them to be exact—to grind and there were all the marks of a "knock 'em down draw" affair, which Referee M. E. Gilbert discouraged by sending five Jarvis players and four of the Waterford team to the pen to cool off. Waterford had a little the better of the combination work, while Jarvis showed up better in individual efforts. Waterford also had a slight edge in the matter of shots on goal. Brock was "right on," and made some seemingly impossible saves. Gilmore also had several opportunities to play his talent, and he turned in a game as scintillating as that of either team was able to secure from the bell to gong. The only save was when H. Smith chipped the puck and got in so close that the goalie had no chance to save and Waterford tallied one in the score column. The procession to the penalty box in the first period as only seven—four from Jarvis, three from Waterford—was an enforced rest.

The third period was equal to the first and second. The struggle was a bitter one and equalled the first in the matter of penalties. Waterford drew five and Jarvis four.

JARVIS CONTINUES SCHOOL REPORT

Waterford and Jarvis will be held early in June. Pupils are recommended or promoted on the average of these four examinations. The average required for pass in each subject is 50%. Failure in three or more subjects precludes promotion. Those who are not recommended in Lower School Departmental Subjects have the privilege of trying the Departmental Examinations in June.
