### Here and There

The city of Halifax, N.S., is planning to re-establish its Fisheries Exhibition this coming fall according to Major Joseph. The fair has only been held once or twice since the war prior to which it was an annual event.

The Canadian Trade Commission at Liverpool, England, is taking steps to interest Canadian businessmen in the export of crushed oyster shells to Great Britain. The United States exports 20,000 tons of crushed shells annually to the British Isles.

The official opening of Crystal Garden, Victoria's latest and finest Amusement Park will take place on June 26th. Celebrations, including a ball, processions, and sports, will mark the occasion and are scheduled to continue until July 1st.

Navigation on the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence is now open and has provided employment for hundreds of men from Montreal, Toronto and other cities who have been idle during the winter. Shipping circles are optimistic concerning the season just commenced.

It is announced that the Banff, Alberta, Pow-Wow and Indians Day celebration which takes place annually, will be held this year, July 23 and 24 in the Yoho Valley. On these days the Stoney tribe of Indians in full regalia, held their Pow-Wow and compete in contests of every kind.

There are approximately 2,200,000 persons attending school in this country. Of this number, 1,600 are at institutions for the blind and mute; 81,000 at vocational schools or classes; 14,000 at Indian schools and the remainder attend colleges, universities, subsidized and private schools and institutions for training teachers.

With a view to arranging a new trade and transportation agreement between Canada and the British West Indies a conference is to be held at Ottawa in June which will be attended by representatives of the Governments of Canada, Bermuda, Leeward and Windward Islands, Barbados, Trinidad, British Guiana, Jamaica and British Honduras.

The gold mines of northern Ontario are said to have yielded a higher income during the first quarter of 1925 than in any similar period in their history. Estimates place the income of mining companies in the Porcupine district at nearly six million dollars and in the Kirkland District at one and a quarter million.

John Hartney, Canadian Pacific Railway engineer, who has recently completed his 42nd year in the company's service, was the guest of honor at a banquet given by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers on St. George's Day at Smiths Falls, Ont. Mr. Hartney, is President Beatty's special engineer and was presented with a gold cane.

In an effort to individualize the name of Saint John, N.B., the City Corporation, Board of Trade, and other organizations are in future to spell its name out in full. This port has grown rapidly in importance in recent years and in addition to being the winter headquarters of the fleet of the Canadian Pacific Railway, is also a port of call for numerous lines operating between Canada and Europe, as well as the centre of a large fishing industry.

On the Canadian Pacific Railway, the first train of the season, the 100th Anniversary train, will start on Monday, March 22nd. The Jersey cattle sale of D. H. Bull & Son in Toronto the other day resulted in the highest average price for the breed yet recorded in the Dominion. Seventy-six animals averaged \$555. This included many yearling heifers and young bulls. The top animal, Brampton Bay Xenia, sold for \$8,000. This is the third highest price ever paid for a Jersey cow in North America.

Canada now holds the world record for winter cruises. With one cruise around the world, another to South America and Africa, a cruise to the Mediterranean and three to the West Indies this season, the red and white bequeathed house flag of the Canadian Pacific is seen in nearly every important port in the world. Next season another cruise is to be added, making two to the Mediterranean, and extensive additions will be made to the itinerary of the "Empress of Australia" on her seventh cruise around the world, starting December 2nd.

The interest of the Prince of Wales in Canadian affairs was demonstrated recently when, following his speech at Mansion House, in London, he visited the British Industries Fair, and spent some time in examining the exhibits of the Canadian Pacific Railway. He took great interest in the railway and models and commended upon the artistic nature of the round the world cruise working model. Her Majesty the Queen, and Prince George passed along the same gangway and showed great interest in the displays.

One of the most colourful and interesting events of the winter season in the west is scheduled to take place in Regina on March 20-22 next when the Great West Canadian Folk Song, Folk Dance, and Handicraft's Festival will be held in the Saskatchewan Hotel in Regina. Over twenty nationalities will be represented in the musical and dance programmes and in the exhibits of handicrafts, and a number of artists from the east will be present. The concerts are being arranged by the Canadian Pacific Railway in cooperation with the Conservatory of Music of Regina College.
