We could not all go, but we could all pray, and she believed prayer our greatest need. She said God would answer prayer, and the same today as of old if we prayed in the right way. God never changes. Then she held her audience for over an hour on sketches from the lives of women and girls in India. In closing her talk, she left these beautiful verses with us:

**OUR DUTY**

The great world's heart is aching,  
Aching fiercely in the night,  
And God alone can heal it,  
And God alone give light,  
And the women to bear that message  
Are you and I, my sisters,  
And the millions that have heard.  
Can we close our eyes to duty?  
Can we hold our hands at ease,  
While the gates of night stand open  
To the pathway of the seas?  
Can we shut up our compassion?  
Can we leave our prayers unsaid  
Till the land which sin has blasted  
Have been quickened from the dead?  
We grovel amid trifles  
And our spirits fret and toss,  
While above us burn the vision  
Of the Christ upon the cross,  
And the blood of God is streaming  
From his broken hands and side  
And the lips of God are saying,  
Tell my sisters I have died.  
At the close, Miss Stillwell was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for her splendid talk which all enjoyed. Miss Stillwell said she was glad she could help in this great work, which only women can do.

The meeting was closed with prayer by the pastor of the church. The Delhi ladies served a bountiful lunch and all enjoyed the social half hour together.
