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HEALTH HINTS

CONSUMPTION
Consumption is contracted by tak-
ing into the system, chiefly through
inhalation, the germs or microbes of
the disease.

These germs contained in the spu-
tum or spit of the consumptive, by
coughing or sneezing, droplets can
be sent into the air, these as well
as the spit, if allowed to mingle with
dust, become dry and can be inhaled
through the air. It is best for a
consumptive to use a handkerchief
when he wishes to spit, cough or
sneeze. It is safety for himself as
well as others. The soaked handker-
chief in a solution of carbolic acid
1 oz. of carbolic acid (is two table-
spoonsful) to a pint of hot water,
as soon as he comes into the home.
It is better to get a piece of paper
or cloth and each time it is used,
burn, if convenient. Still a sputum
bottle is handier as it can be used
and cleaned daily, by boiling in cold
water brought to a boil for ten
minutes or more.

The food should never be allowed
to be set in the room, it should be
brought to him in only such quanti-
ties as are required for immediate
use. Kissing by a consumptive per-
son should not be, for the sake of
the other person or persons, as it
is an easy way to give the disease
to another. Dishes should be kept
separate from others and boiled.
Never shake rugs or carpets, use
wet cloths on the broom or when
dusting the rooms. These can be
boiled.

The special measure required for
producing conditions destructive to
the virulence of tubercle bacilli,
which may have found lodgment in a
house are, fortunately, those best
calculated to preserve and improve
the health of the inmates. These are
fresh air, light, sunshine and dryness.
They aid the individual to resist the
establishment of the germ of the dis-
ease and are most destructive to its
vitality. Ventilation is most im-
portant where the air is laden with
dust and gaseous fumes. The breath
from the lungs contains organic mat-
ter which becomes poisonous if re-
breathed. If rooms are not properly
ventilated persons breathing it be-
come weakened and this may make
them predisposed to consumption. All
rooms should be kept clean and sani-
tary, otherwise the air can never be
pure. Cleanliness and good sanitary

arrangements are essential for the
prevention as well as the cure of the
disease. Never put coins, articles of
the toilet, or other small objects in-
to your mouth. Do not use a pipe
or blow into an instrument that has
been used by any other person. The
current to which outdoor exercise and
fresh air should be indulged in should
be regulated by the physician in
charge, also the daily dietary given
to the patient.
