**Department of Health**

The marvel of Ontario's power development and the application of electricity to illumination and transportation systems of the city, to the machinery of industry, to lighting and cooking in the home, has a parallel even more marvellous in the development of the services now available to the people of Ontario through the Department of Health.

**COMMUNITY HEALTH.**

Any community, large or small, is free to ask for help under any item of municipal health administration, viz.: control of communicable diseases, the establishment, maintenance or extension of water supply and sewerage disposal, garbage collection, milk supply, public health nursing, child health or dental service programs, together with routine or emergency laboratory service.

**HEALTH IN INDUSTRY.**

Industry has its own health problems and special service is proffered by the Department to further the health of the worker in industry. Any industrial management may request help to meet the health needs of its plant, because the Department realizes that health plays just as important a part in plant operation as the horsepower which makes the wheels go round.

**HEALTH IN THE HOME.**

In the home the real fight for health is staged, and into the home the Department sends knowledge of every new discovery after it has been carefully tried and tested. The home is using this knowledge in every-day life just as it pushes the electric button to light the floor lamp or heat the electric iron. It is because the mothers of Ontario have used this health knowledge that Ontario's infants are not dying from diseases due to incorrect feeding in such large numbers as formerly; it is due to the splendid co-operation of Ontario parents that 40,000 children were protected against diphtheria last year, and it will be through the efforts made in our homes that preventable disease—diabetes, tuberculosis and cancer as well as the acute infectious diseases—will be reduced in this Province. Personal health means community health, national health, and personal health depends in the home.

**DIVISIONAL ORGANIZATION.**

The Department is organized into a series of Divisions, each responsible for its own job:

- Division of Sanitary Engineering.
- Division of Preventable Diseases.
- Division of Child Hygiene.
- Division of Laboratories.
- Division of Industrial Hygiene.
- Division of Dental Services.
- Division of Vital Statistics.
- Division of Nurse Registration.
- Division of Public Health Education.

**Liquor Smuggling**

Manitoba Free Press (Lib.): There is a point of view fairly common in this country that there is nothing wrong with Canada shipping to the United States all the liquor that the Americans will buy, especially in view of the fact that they appear to be willing purchasers. Officially, however, the United States is under prohibition, and it is a legal offence to import liquor into the country. The Federal Government of the United States (which has in hand the enforcement of the prohibition law, has succeeded in making agreements with practically all other nations that export liquor whereby these countries refrain from giving port clearance to liquor shipments to the United States. So far Canada has refused to accept the American viewpoint. Liquor is given clearance from Canadian to United States port, although it is known in Canada that the cargo can only be landed at a United States port by breaking the laws of that country.
