THE BUFFALO AND CLEVELAND STEAMER SERVICE

Weather conditions point to an early opening of lake travel between Buffalo and Cleveland. The steamer service will probably start about 15th of April, according to Mr. P. J. Swartz, General Manager of The Cleveland and Buffalo Transit Company, with steamers leaving each way every night at 9:00 p.m., arriving at the opposite terminus at 7:30 a.m.

All of the palatial steamers of the C & B Line have undergone their annual house cleaning and renovating and are more attractively equipped than ever before to handle the thousands of summer travelers who will enjoy the beauties of Lake Erie again this season.

Another added attraction of C & B Service, as announced by Mr. Swartz, will be a very fine orchestra on the Great Ship "SEANDBEE." This orchestra will give a concert every evening, followed by dancing in the main dining room of the Great Ship on her nightly trips between Buffalo and Cleveland.

The new Port Stanley Division of the C & B Line is expected to greatly increase the traffic between Canada and Northern Ohio's famous summer resorts.
