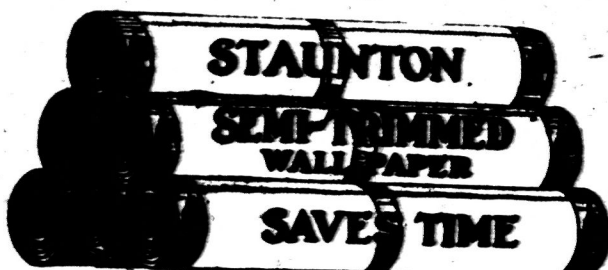

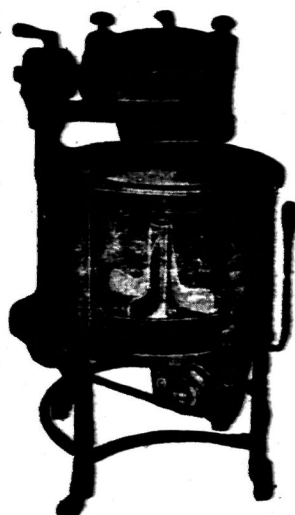

of the week. Organized health protection, supervision and education are needed both by rich and poor. The expenditure of a dollar or two per capita is very cheap compared to the health insurance which no community can afford to neglect. It is the well-to-do who carry individual sickness insurance; the public health expenditures represent a measure of insurance covering all classes in the community.

HEALTH HINTS

TYPHOID FEVER

Typhoid fever is a communicable disease caused by the typhoid bacillus germ. It is both contagious and infectious. The disease is usually transmitted by means of water, ice, milk or food containing typhoid germs. Bad sanitary surroundings, such as lack of drainage, defective plumbing, open cesspools, sewer gas, decaying animal and vegetable matter, etc., may predispose a person to the disease. It may also be contracted by people who come into direct contact with those having the disease. Typhoid germs will live for a long time in the soil, and if patients' discharges are thrown upon or put into the ground or into any other place without previous disinfection, the drainage may infect a well or other supply of drinking water. Ice is a frequent source of infection. Typhoid germs may be in milk which may become contaminated by someone whose hands have come in contact with discharges of a patient or by flies who come in contact with typhoid discharges. Uncooked food may cause the disease by being washed in infected water, or by flies, or by being handled by infected hands. Many typhoid patients are so very slightly sick that the disease is not recognized as typhoid. Yet their discharges contain typhoid germs. Such cases are a source of danger if the proper care is not taken. Both the faeces and urine contain the typhoid germs for weeks, yes months, after the patients have recovered. The public should also support the provincial board of health in its contention that no community or individual has a right to pollute any source of drinking water with sewage. Precaution—use water which has been boiled. Keep windows and doors well screened to keep flies out.

which has been explained later in this paper. If possible, one should... should take entire charge of the patient and no one else besides the physician should be allowed to enter the room. This attendant should avoid unnecessary contact with other occupants of the house.

Floors and household pots should be excluded from the sick room. Plates, cups, glasses, knives, forks, spoons, etc., used by the patient, should not be used or washed by others. Wash dishes in hot soap suds and then rinse in hot water, in the room with the patient; nothing must be taken out. Remnants of food should not be taken to a kitchen, should be burned outside the house or in some other room.
