### Work on Tubs

Mr. Patterson is desirous to have a grant in his favor, and has had a letter to that effect in hand. The furniture that was ordered by your Supply Committee has been installed, and with the decorating of the Home nearly completed it makes the Home look real life.

We have now a beautiful lot of five Jersey cows, with three Jersey female calves, which is a credit to the Home and County.

### BUILDING COMMITTEE

The following report of the Building Committee was adopted as a resolution: That the jailer and turnkey be authorized to have plaster repaired in the jail kitchen, and that we recommend the payment of \$2.25 for repairs to the Registry office.

### COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

The Council having met in Committee of the Whole with Messrs. C. H. Aldridge in the chair, the following report of that committee was adopted:

That Messrs. Harrison Arroll and W. J. Saunders be recommended as members of the Mothers' Allowance Board for the County of Haldimand.

That the Finance Committee be authorized to pay \$141.10 to the Simcoe Board of Education, balance for the maintenance of Walpole township pupils during 1927.

That the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Cayuga be instructed not to cash any of the good roads account cheques unless presented within 45 days of their date.

That a grant of \$50 be made to any student attending the Agricultural College at Guelph, recommended by the District Agricultural Representative, the Warden, and one other member of the Council.

### GOOD ROADS COMMITTEE

Your committee made a very careful inspection of all roads on the County Highway System and found:

## Here and There

A fine steel piano wire runs now 1264 miles from Newfoundland to the Azores. This is not to provide the mermaids with strings for their harps but to measure exactly the distance between the two points. A cable was laid recently and it was impossible to otherwise determine the precise distance travelled by the cable-laying ship.

Travellers aboard the Canadian Pacific Railway's crack summer flyer, the Trans Canada Limited, will be surprised this year to find colorful upholstery, green tiled bathrooms, sofas settees, a glassed-in conservatory and other unusual features. Special sleeping, dining, and lounge parlours, cars have been designed and built at the company's Montreal Angus shops for this de luxe transcontinental train, which will be one of the fastest and finest long distance trains in the world.

Construction of the 19-storey Marine Building on the corner of Burrard and Hastings streets, in Vancouver, has begun. When completed this will be the tallest building west of Toronto, where the greatest building, the new Royal York Hotel, of the C. P. R., is 23 storeys in height.

A monument to one of the builders of Canada is planned for Vancouver. Sir William Van Horne, first general manager and second president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was responsible for the selection of Vancouver as the western terminus for the transcontinental line; a decision that resulted in the growth and prosperity of Canada's second greatest seaport; and the citizens of the city propose to commemorate his foresight.

Every year the Canadian Pacific spends about \$2,000,000 in advertising its services and Canada's industrial and tourist attractions throughout the world.

In view of the present prosperity of Canada and of the Canadian Pacific, it is amusing to recall the item published in London Truth over forty-five years ago. "The Canadian Pacific Railway," it runs, "has begun to launch its bonds. This railway, if it be ever finished, will run through a country frost-bound for seven or eight months of the year, and will connect with the eastern part of the Dominion a province which embraces about as forbidding country as any on the face of the earth. British Columbia is a barren, cold mountain country that is not worth keeping. It would never have been inhabited at all unless by trappers of the Hudson Bay Company had 'gold fever' not taken a party of adventurers there. Fifty railroads would not galvanize it into prosperity. The much-touted Manitoba settlement will not hold out many years. The people who have gone there cannot stand the coldness of the winters. Men and cattle are frozen to death in the freezing winter. It is a waste of money to build a railway there, and those who are not killed outright are often maimed for life by frostbite."

The majority of the roads have been through the winter in very good condition.

Road No. 21, known as the Five-mile road, has been damaged considerably by high water, being flooded several times. We have had a couple of days having 2-inch stone filling the holes made by the strong current of water passing over the road. We hope that the river will soon be down to normal and we will have the road put in a good shape as possible so that traffic will not be held up.

The road will not be in a shape to carry heavy loads for some time, as it is very spongy where it has been flooded, and we would ask all those using the road for trucking to load as lightly as possible until the road gets solid.

Your committee would recommend that the expenditure for maintenance be \$100,000.00 and for construction \$20,000.00 as per detailed statement.

The two traffic officers employed by the County have been keeping a very close check on the traffic, and have succeeded in keeping the public from overloading and damaging the roads. We would recommend that a Patrol Foreman be employed for Road No. 21, from the Village of Cayuga to Grant County Line.

We would recommend that a Patrol Foreman be employed for Road No. 9, from Provincial Highway No. 3 to Blackheath.

We would recommend that permission be given this committee to sell the Case steam tractor, Case rock crusher and 6 h.p. gas engine with hoisting attachment providing the price is satisfactory to this committee.

Lockie-Laidlaw — That the York bridge being damaged that the bridge be closed to traffic until repaired. Cd

Colter-Aldridge — That the Good Roads Committee be a delegation to wait on the Minister of Highways with reference to the immediate taking over by the Province as a Provincial Highway of the River road between Cayuga and Caledonia and that when the chairman of the Good Roads Committee has made the appointment he notify the Clerks most immediately affected by the said road to the date of same. Carried.

Council adjourned to meet on May 14th, at 10 a.m.
