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LOCAL MANSIONS HOLD MUNICIPAL NIGHT

LANDON BOOKER IVEY

Maple Leaf, May 3rd Friday morning the Hand of Death claimed one of the best known and an outstanding citizen of the village and County in the person of Landon Booker Ivey who passed away at his residence, McNab Street, Port Dover, in his 56th year.

The late Mr. Ivey was perhaps more widely known through his connection with the firm of Thos. A. Ivey & Sons, and during the twenty-one years the plant has been located in the village he has held the responsible position of Vice-President, and had done his share in the great task of the development of the plant that had grown from a small beginning to its present vast proportions, and with the recent additions is now the second largest of its kind in the Dominion of Canada. "L.B." as he was popularly known among his wide circle of friends, was a man of sterling character, wide vision and a gentleman of the old school in every sense of the term. He found time to serve the municipality in the capacity of councillor for a number of years and held office during the period of the most important development work of the village, at the time when the waterworks, etc., were being installed. He served under the able guidance of the Hon. John S. Martin, and when the latter had to give up municipal work to enter the wider sphere as minister of agriculture Mr. Ivey was approached to accept the reeve-ship, but ill health prevented this. As a member of Erie Lodge deceased had given freely of his time, and served for one year as Worshipful Master, following his appointment and election to the various other offices in the lodge. For many

years he had been a member of the Board of Trade, taking a leading part in the work of that organization. He was also a valued member of the Port Dover Improvement Association, the Port Dover Board of Education, the Norfolk Golf and Country Club, the Canadian Club, Chamber of Commerce, and other organizations.

In fact Landon Ivey was always in the forefront when it came to advancing the best interests of the village where he had made his home, and in his passing Port Dover loses a citizen of sterling worth, whose place will be hard to fill.

Landon Booker Ivey was born at Nanticoke, Ont., and was the eldest son of the late Thomas A. Ivey and Mrs. Nancy Ivey. As a young man he engaged in the florists' business in Brantford, later entering the employ of some of the larger commercial plants in the United States, travelling in Montana, Minneapolis, and other points. He then pitched his tent in the Canadian West, but returned to make his home in Port Dover where he has resided for the past twenty-one years, when the firm of Thos. A. Ivey & Sons Limited was first established.

Deceased had been ailing for some time, and last winter travelled extensively in Florida in order to miss the rigors of the Canadian winter, returning home about a month ago. During the continued cold spell he contracted a severe cold, and this was followed by pneumonia, and despite the best of nursing and medical skill he passed peacefully away about 3 a.m. this morning.
