DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND PAYS AN OFFICIAL VISIT

The official visit of the representative of the Grand Master always looked forward to with more than ordinary interest in fraternal circles. In the case of the Masonic order, it is conceded one of the outstanding events of the year. It was just such an auspicious occasion that drew the brethren of King Solomon Lodge, No. 329, together on Friday evening of last week, and District Deputy Grand Master T. J. Kirby, of Brantford, accompanied by many distinguished brethren from that city were greeted by a large assemblage of brethren of our local and neighboring lodges.

The routine work in the lodge room was completed with snap and precision, and the opening and closing in the three degrees—under the direction of W. Master J. H. Brown—convinced the D.D.G.M. that in King Solomon Lodge the ancient landmarks of the order are being kept sacred and inviolable; and that the officers of the lodge were alert and did not underestimate the honors conferred upon them; but keenly appreciated the responsibilities that were theirs in the discharge of their duties. It was not to be wondered at, then, that the D.D.G.M. handed the boys bouquets on their proficiency, which was the more marked by the fact that no set work had been undertaken for the occasion. The distinguished visitor, representing, as he does, the Most W. The Grand Master, the Hon. John S. Martin, of Port Dover, was introduced by Rt. W. Bro. J. J. Parsons, P.D.D.G.M. of Brant District, and was accorded the honors befitting his exalted rank.

THE FOURTH DEGREE

An early adjournment was made to the banquet room, where Bro. Nixon, as Junior Warden, had prepared an excellent repast with generous cuts of prime roast of beef comprising the main piece de resistance. The after-dinner mints were few, but what was lacking in quantity (if anything) was more than made up in quality for each short address was a gem in itself.

It fell to the lot of Rt. W. Bro. J. J. Parsons to take the lead and bid the visitors welcome. The speaker pulled back the curtain of time, which revealed a past crowded with happy memories. A few years ago he was elected District Deputy Grand Master, and what a happy year it had been! He had made many new friends—and he would ever cherish the kindly courtesies and painstaking way in which the men at the helm of Masonry in Brantford had always rallied to his aid, mentioning particularly the occasion when the Grand Master visited the district, and Mr. Parsons was able to take things easier in the knowledge that the Brantford men had taken a hold and would not fall down even in the minutest detail. Following the same line of thought, but two short years ago, the speaker recalled the visit of Rt. W. Bro. Byerson, and of the latter's address on that occasion when he told them something of the high ideals and great achievements of that greatest Commonwealth the world has ever known—the British Empire—and that address," said Mr. Parsons, "is still a vivid recollection. I oft think and ponder over it. It fills one with wonderment and it creates a feeling of justifiable pride when we realize that we are a unit in that great Empire and have a part to play."
