HALDIMAND BASEBALL LEAGUE TO OPEN SEASON IN JARVIS

The official opening of the Haldimand County Amateur Baseball League will take place at the Jarvis Celebration on Friday, May 24th, the first game, Caledonia vs. Dunnville, will start at 12:30 sharp and the second game, Simcoe vs. Fisherville, will take place immediately after the first game. Jarvis Celebration Committee have made arrangements with the League Officials to have all four teams on the grounds at 12:30, when the opening ceremony will take place. Mr. A. G. Emerson, ex-member of the O.B.A.A. and president of the league will make the opening address; Mr. L. Marshall, Reeve of Jarvis, will pitch the first ball; Mr. Geo. L. Miller will catch and W. J. Saunders, Reeve of Walpole, will be the first batter up. Follow the boys to see the opening ceremony and two league games.

DISTRICT NUMBER TWO ELIMINATION GAMES

The fifth annual provincial school boy athletic championships will be held at Queen's University stadium, Kingston, on August 23rd. These games will be under the direction of the Ontario Athletic Commission and the athletes, during their stay in Kingston, will be the guests of the officials of Queen's University. The two-day program calls for a tour of the Thousand Islands under the auspices of the University.

The province has been divided into 10 districts and elimination games are being held in each district during the next four weeks. The winners of the various events in the district games, providing they reach the standards laid down, will have all their expenses to the championship finals paid by the Ontario Athletic Commission. The runners-up in the various events are also eligible to compete in the finals but at their own expense. District Number Two consists of the schools in Acton, Beamsville, Brantford, Burlington, Bridgeburg, Caledonia, Cayuga, Dundas, Dunnville, Freelon, Georgetown, Grimsby, Guelph, Hagersville, Hamilton, Jarvis, Lynden, Melton, Niagara Falls, Port Colborne, Port Dover, Ridgeway, Rockwood, St. Catharines, St. George, Selkirk, Smithville, Stevensville, Thorold, Watford and Welland. Boys in attendance at any school in the area mentioned are eligible to compete at the District No. 2 eliminations which will be held at the Hamilton stadium on Saturday, May 25th.

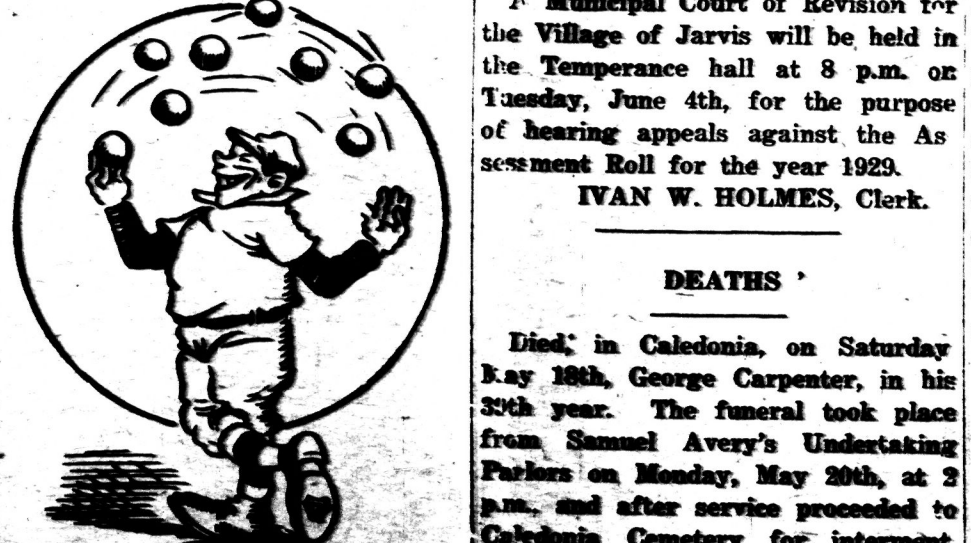

APPEAL ALLOWED

In An Action Over the Disposition of Money on Deposit

Stadler vs. Canadian Bank of Commerce, Anguish and Reid—An action brought by John Stadler, executor of the will of William Downs, late of Jarvis, for a declaration that \$2800, on deposit in the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Hagersville to the joint credit of Wm. Downs and his wife, belonged on the death of both parties to the estate of William Downs. He died in November, 1922, leaving a will in which he gave to his wife the use of all his property during her life, and on her death what remained was to be divided among his nephews, John Stadler, and two nieces, Christina Anguish and Ruth Ross. He owned a house and lot in Jarvis, and the money on deposit.

His wife became insane in the fall of 1921, and the money was transferred to the Public Trustee. She was released in February, 1922, and the Public Trustee returned the money to her. She deposited it in the Bank of Commerce to the credit of the late Wm. Downs and his wife. The executor claimed that Mrs. Downs had no right to deposit the money; that the joint account between her and her husband was for convenience only, and that the money belonged to Wm. Downs. The action was tried before Chief Justice Meredith at Cayuga on November 6, 1922, when the executor's action was dismissed with costs.

The executor entered an appeal, which was heard by the Second Divisional Court, composed of Chief Justice Latchford, and Justices Reid, Masten, Orde and Fisher, in February last, and judgment was reserved. Last week the judgment of the Court of Appeal was rendered, allowing the appeal and holding that the money belonged to the estate of Wm. Downs, and must be paid over to the executor.

British American Oil Co., Limited vs. Shurr—An action brought by the Oil Co. against the defendant for damage done to a gasoline pump in Jarvis by the defendant's truck. The defendant admitted that damage was done to the pump by his truck, but said that the damages claimed were excessive; that the damage was due to his truck slipping on an icy pavement; that he was not negligent, and was not liable, and that plaintiff had no authority to put the pump there. The case was heard by his Honor Judge Hopkins, who held that the defendant was not negligent and was not liable; that plaintiffs had no right to put the pump where it was without leave from the Council, and if on appeal his judgment was reversed he fixed the damages at \$50. The plaintiffs appealed and the appeal was heard by the First Division Court composed of Chief Justice Mulock and Justices Magee Hodgins, Middleton and Grant, when the appeal was dismissed and the judgment of Judge Hopkins was upheld. Grant Cooper Toronto, for plaintiff, and R. S. Colter, K.C., for the defendant.
