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## WORK STARTED ON JARVIS-PORT DOVER HIGHWAY

Maple Leaf May 24  
A definite start was made Tuesday morning on the Port Dover-Jarvis highway, being work preparatory to paving and bringing the road up to standard of provincial highways. The contractors had gangs working from the Jarvis end. One of the biggest features of the work will be the cut to be made through the Edmondson property, which will be commenced in about three weeks time. The surface soil is to be utilized for filling near the swing bridge also between the road and the railway track from the bridge to the station, and from A. McJueen's corner store to St. George street, and if there is surplus soil to dispose of it will be dumped from Kurz Garage toward Clinton street, on the C.N.R. property now leased by the village. In all some 47,000 cubic yards will be available for this work.

## FERRY SERVICE FOR 1929 OFFICIALLY ANNOUNCED

Fort Dover-Erie Service is to be maintained on schedule this summer according to official word received in the village yesterday. The Nicholson Erie-Dover Ferry Line have secured one boat, "City of St. Ignace," and are still scouring the country in an effort to secure a second boat for this service. Up to the time of going to press no second boat has been located, but the one boat service will be considerably better than nothing at all. The City of St. Ignace is a much larger boat than those previously used on this Dover-Erie service, and arrangements are being made to have the old Shenango slip dredged to sufficient depth to accommodate this new boat. The service is to start on June 29th, but so far no definite hour of arrival. Citizens of Port Dover will learn with much pleasure of this latest announcement and they will, too, be giving Reeve Misner considerable credit for the work he has done and his determination to get the ferry service continued for this season is another one of the many good things the Reeve has in a great measure secured for Port Dover.

It is stated on reliable authority that the City of St. Ignace will accommodate 80 automobiles, and this should mean an even greater increase on the number of cars carried last year.

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## 24th Celebration Big Success

Friday, May 24th, 1929, was a real letter day for Jarvis. We celebrated in the good old-fashioned way and the day was a success.

Early in the morning the Royal Salute was made manifest by Chief E. Elliott and his cohorts arousing the natives with the strenuous tones of the fire truck parading through the streets.

At 10 o'clock the great Calithumpian parade left the park and marched through the main streets of the village, headed by the Hindoo Kooch jazz band and Geo. L. Miller's Punkin Riders, and before the final roundup at the park again and the judges had made their decision, the day was off to a good start and everyone full of "pep."

This was followed by a softball game before the noon hour between the Punkin Riders and Lea Marshall's Greasers, which provided a real amusement, but was easily won by the Punkin Riders.

The game was umpired by that old veteran of the diamond, Bill Hodges, who handed out some RAW decisions. He appears to favor the Greasers and the Punkin Riders freely expressed the belief that he was sore greased.

The afternoon was fully taken up with the Haldimand County League baseball games, of which a full report follows, as well as the winners of the horseshoe tournament, athletic sports, etc.

The jitney dance in the afternoon was greatly patronized and the evening dance, under the auspices of the Booster Club, drew a record attendance.

## HALDIMAND LEAGUE GAMES

The chief interest of the afternoon centered around the baseball diamond, where the four teams of the Haldimand-Norfolk League met to play their opening league games, and the large crowd, made up largely of the supporters of the respective teams, was kept interested during the two sessions.

## Caledonia 9—Dunnville 1

The first game announced by "Col." Burwash through the megaphone was Caledonia vs. Dunnville, naming the batteries, also announcing that a Toronto clothing firm were offering a suit of clothes to the player having the best batting average during the afternoon. The president of the league, A. C. Erverson of Caledonia, was then called upon to declare the league season open, which he did with a very few words. The teams then took the field, Caledonia going to bat. This game resulted in a one-sided score, Dunnville getting their only run in the opening innings, after which they were unable to do much against the effective pitching of "Left" Stewart, the Caledonia twirler, while Caledonia garnered nine runs off the offerings of "Lefty" Blackwell on the mound for Dunnville. Simcoe tried two pitchers, Jackson, a south-paw, pitching the first seven innings, and Fort, the shortstop, finishing the game. Otterman, a right-hander, twirled the full route for Fisherville and his cool manner in the box and excellent control, backed by the heavy hitting of his team mates, was too much for Simcoe, and if we are not mistaken, they will cause trouble for the other teams in the league during the season.
