During the war between Poland and the Soviets in 1920, flanzig, on the pies of maintaining its neutrality, refused to unload some cargoes of munitions des-tined for the Polish army. It is probsble that even without the incentive of avoiding similar trouble for the future, Poland would have decided to have its own port on its own territory. but it is undeniable that the action of the Danzigers made a probability into a certainty.

Danzig's rival, or collaborator, is built on what the world calls 'the Polish corridor,' but which the Poles prefer to describe as Pomorze. The Poles justify their possession of this region by the fact that the inhabitants are of Slavonic origin and therefore are a kindred race, but there is no doubt that the existence of this narrow neck of land, running north and south and separating East Prussia from the rest of Germany, is a cause of considerable irritation to the

On the other hand, if it did not exist there would be an exactly similar strip of territory running east and west and dividing Poland from its coveted contact with the sea. As things are at present, travelers passing from one part of Germany to the other across the corridor find themselves subjected to some inconveniences, such as being loked in their compartments while the train is on Polish territory. If the corridor were the other way round, it would be the Polish travelers who would encounter difficulties.
