Here and There

"The greatest apple crop in the history of Nova Scotia," is the almost unanimous opinion expressed by prominent fruit growers and Government experts of the province. It is estimated the crop will reach 2,500,000 barrels, at least half a million barrels more than any other crop ever raised in Nova Scotia.

In preparation for the opening of the 1929 big game hunting season in New Brunswick, 25,000 hunting licenses have been sent out from the Department of Lands and Mines to 300 vendors in all parts of the province.

E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, accompanied by a group of directors of the company, is now on his annual tour of inspection of company's properties and conditions in the west. Resorts, agricultural centres, experimental farms, mines and smelting plants, as well as the system itself was inspected during the tour which started September 5 from Montreal and closes at Winnipeg October 2.

"I am watching with the greatest interest the progress being achieved in the United States where railways are experimenting in the use of aeroplanes as adjuncts to their railway services," said E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, interviewed at Toronto recently. "There they are using planes by day in certain places and rail travel by night and the experiments are very interesting to me," the president added.

Two first prizes, three seconds, and a third award were won by the Canadian Pacific Railway supply farms championship Holstein herd from Strathmore, Alta., at the 60th annual provincial exhibition at New Westminster recently. This is a follow-up to the Vancouver Show where the herd led all others.

Up to the end of August, says Colonel J. S. Dennis, chief commissioner of the railway's department of colonization and development, the Canadian Pacific brought to Canada 1792 boys for placement in agricultural employment under the distributive schemes of the company. "This is the largest number of British boys brought out to the Dominion by any one organization," says the Colonel.

Back from a month's wanderings along the line of the Dominion Atlantic Railway in Nova Scotia, Miss Juliette Gaultier de la Verendrye, noted folksong artist, stated that she had discovered 300 folksongs that were either quite unknown hitherto or else were interesting variants in melody and tune to similar songs in vogue among the French-Canadian habitants. She will sing some of them at forthcoming concerts.

During the first five months of the year 5,389 homesteads representing 662,240 acres of land were taken out in Alberta, settlement being mainly in the Edmonton, Grande Prairie, Peace River and Prince Albert districts.

PUBLIC NOTICE

To All Persons Having Registered Claims, or Claims of which Notice has been Registered existing prior to June 1st, 1930, against lands in any Registry Division in Ontario.

Whereas "The Investigation of Titles Act, 1929," enacts inter alia:

3 (1)—From and after the coming into force of this sub-section, no person in dealing with land shall be required to show that he is lawfully entitled to such land as owner thereof through a good and sufficient chain of title, save and except during the period of forty years immediately preceding the date of such dealing as aforesaid, and no claim which has been in existence longer than the said forty year period shall affect such land, unless such claim shall have been acknowledged or specifically referred to or contained in an instrument registered against such land within the said forty-year period or unless a notice is registered against such land as provided in sub-sections 3, 4 and 5 hereof.

3 (2) Sub-section 1 shall come into force on the 1st day of June, 1930.

3 (3) Upon the coming into force of this Act and within one year thereafter, any person having a claim against any land, which claim has been in existence for forty years or more prior to the coming into force of this Act, but in respect to which claim no notice of its existence has been given, acknowledged, or specifically referred to or contained in an instrument registered against such land within forty years prior to the coming into force of this Act, or any person on his behalf may register in the proper registry office a notice in which shall be set forth the claimant's full name and address and a description of the land and a detailed statement of such claim, verified by the affidavit of the person registering such notice.

3 (6) The registration of a notice as provided in sub-sections 3, 4 and 5 shall not in any way validate a claim which has otherwise expired.

THEREFORE TAKE NOTICE that any person having a claim against any land as above set forth must register notice thereof in the proper registry office before June 1st, 1930. If this is not done, except under certain conditions, then any land which is subject to such claim so registered prior to June 1st, 1930, or any claim existing prior to June 1st, 1930, of which no notice has been registered, shall be absolutely freed and released therefrom.

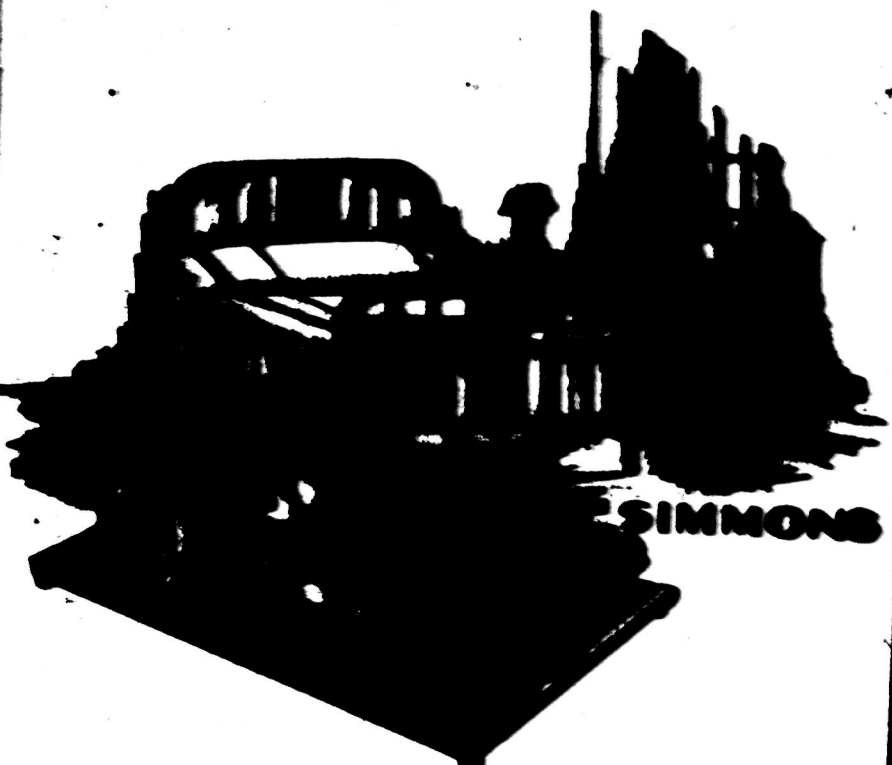
