## INFANTILE PARALYSIS

Owing to the prevalence in various parts of the province of that much dreaded disease, Infantile Paralysis, and particularly to the fact that it exists, though not to the degree of an epidemic in some of our neighboring communities, too much care cannot be observed in looking after the child suffering from anything that may even remotely simulate this disease. Do not therefore depend upon your own diagnosis. It may be right, but then again it may not. Send for your doctor early. He will be better able than you to diagnose the case—and when he sees it in its very early stages—may be able to ward off the evil and often fatal results, particularly the paralysis, which, once it develops, is almost certain to be permanent and often fatal.

1. The onset of Infantile Paralysis—or as it is known to medical men Anterior Poliomyelitis—is usually very abrupt, rapid pulse, fever usually below 102 and often headache. Vomiting occurs in perhaps 50 percent of the cases, early in the disease, but diarrhoea not so common.

2. Throat moderately sore, inflamed and swollen, but no cough.

3. There is great tendency to perspire—which is looked upon by some to be a pronounced characteristic of the disease in its earlier stages.

4. One of the most characteristic symptoms of the disease is stiffness rigidity of the neck and back with pain pronounced, on any attempt to lift the body from the bed or of the child to rise from the recumbent position or sit up in bed. The child will hold his back stiffly and prop himself up with his arms. Any attempt to bring his chin forward to touch his chest is accompanied by extreme pain. The pain, too, is common in the lower back in region of kidneys.

5. An almost constant symptom, too, is general hyperaesthesia—extreme sensitiveness, or pain to the touch all over the body. Child is irritable and cries when even lightly touched by the mother or doctor. He begs to be left alone.

6. Face is flushed and wears an anxious expression and child is drowsy when undisturbed.

7. In from two to four days paralysis develops and while various muscles may be affected it is usually confined to an arm, or a leg or maybe both. Paralysis is not an early symptom, though occasionally it is said to appear almost synonymously with the early appearance of the disease—but once this does occur, no treatment is of much avail to completely restore the functions of the part affected. Fortunately, but let this not misguide you, the disease on rare occasions, runs its course and no paralysis results.
