The new system is taking hold well in the West, and as more beef fit for grading comes through from the Canadian livestock men graded beef will be better known on the eastern market with resultant advantages to all concerned.

Better Feed Standards

Better feed oats and barley is assured by the new regulations of the Seed Branch of the Deminion Department of Agriculture which require a more careful elimination of weed seeds. Under these new regulations, while wild oats and other grains present are taken into consideration, the quality of the grain itself now mainly determines the grade. In the past there have been frequent

complaints, especially from the eastern feeders, of the excess of weed seeds contained in feed grain from the west. Under the grain inspection practices now in force even the lowest grades of feed seed oats and barley may have not more than 3 per cent. of weed seeds.

With this new system of inspection Scotsmen Rejoice in New in operation eastern feeders will be able to buy feed oats and feed barley on certificate, and with much greater assurance as to the cleanliness and quality of the grain so purchased.
