Sixty head of pedigree cattle and sheep from the Royal estate in England is the object of Professor W. L. Cayley's trip to the Old Country about S.S. Minnesota recently. They are destined for the Prince of Wales ranch at High River, Alberta, and are a further proof of His Royal Highness' interest in improving Canadian live stock.

"As far as the army is concerned the horse will be a museum piece within the next 20 years," said Brig-General W. B. M. King, recent arrival on S.S. Duchess of York, after a trip during which he inspected remnants of the British Army. General King added that the mechanization of the army was taking rapid strides and, though a costly operation, would pay for itself by decreased maintenance charges within a period of five years.

New Brunswick has an estimated population of 419,000, according to the twelfth annual report of the chief medical officer of the provincial department of health issued in the Legislature recently. An interesting detail of the report was that more than 25,000 persons had been immunized against diphtheria.
