Here and There

Prior to leaving on S.S. Mo-
tama with his niece, Miss Helen
MacKenzie, who is to be married
in London next month, His Honor
R. Randolph Bruce, Lieutenant-
Governor of British Columbia, at-
tended the official opening of the
New Brunswick provincial legis-
lature in his trip by Canadian Pa-
cific across the Dominion. Mr.
Bruce called on every Lieutenant-
Governor in Canada.

Captain A. J. Hoskins, R.N., ship-
per of Canadian Pacific liner Em-
press of Russia, was recently win-
ner for the second time in suc-
cession of the E. W. Beatty shield for
safety and efficiency. The shield
was donated in 1923 by the chair-
man and president of the railway
for competition among company
ships of the Pacific fleet.

First week in March witnessed
the addition of Alberta and Sas-
katchewan to the Canadian Pa-
cific Railway's broadcasting chain
which now covers Montreal, To-
ronto, Winnipeg, Fleming, for Sas-
katchewan and Calgary for Alber-
ta. Songs of the broadcast in-
clude "Cheerful and Good," and sea
chanties and songs from ballad
operas together with high class
orchestral pieces are put on the air
every Friday night between 10 and
11 Eastern time.

In Ottawa electricity for domes-
tic use is cheaper than anywhere
else on the continent, if not in the
world, according to authorities on
the subject. It is sold at a rate
that averages less than one cent
per kilowatt-hour which means
that the average bill for electric
light incurred by citizens of the
Canadian Capital is about \$1 per
month.

At the World's Poultry Congress
to be held at the Crystal Palace,
London, England, next July, Can-
ada will be a conspicuous partici-
pant. The Canadian exhibit of
live birds will total about 1,000.
The last World's Congress was
held in Ottawa in 1907.

One of the largest real estate
transactions of modern times will
be put through at the present ses-
sion of the Canadian Federal Par-
liament, when legislation will be
submitted to enable the Govern-
ment to hand over millions of acres
of land, a substantial amount of
water power, vast forest wealth
and other natural resources to the
provinces of Manitoba, Alberta
and British Columbia.

The music, songs and dances of
Latin, Celtic, Scandinavian, Slav,
Toucan and British will all be re-
presented for Canadian partici-
pation month when on March 19-23, the
third Great West Canadian Folk
Dance, Folk Song and Handicrafts
Festival will be held under the
auspices of the Canadian Pacific
Railway at the Palliser Hotel in
Calgary.

Unusually heavy pre-Septen wed-
dings were indicated this month
from the Windsor street station,
Montreal, when 25 bleeding honey-
moons left that city for Ottawa,
Quebec and New York on one
morning. Station officials
that this is very heavy for the
time of year and comes close to
the number leaving the station on
mornings of Cupid's special month
of June.

Purchase of the Algonquin Eastern
Railway by the Canadian Pacific
Railway is announced by P. W.
Roarty, chairman and president
of the latter company. The trans-
fer runs between Little Current
and Sudbury and its purchase is
subject to approval of the board of
Directors of the Canadian Pacific
and to ratification by shareholders
at the annual meeting to be held
May 7 next.

For several years Canada has led
the world in aerial surveying and
last year consolidated that leader-
ship by applying, for the first time
in any country, aerial methods to
geologic reconnaissance and trans-
portation. Around 70,000 square
miles were covered by aerial photo-
graphs last year by the Royal Cana-
dian Air Force and the Canadian
Government Department of the In-
terior.

Canadian investments abroad at
the end of 1928 totalled \$1,573,073,
000, according to a recent official
estimate. Of this amount \$674,623,
000 is invested in the United States;
\$311,915,000 in Great Britain; and
\$577,533,000 in other countries.

Available horsepower in Canada
is 20,197,000 horse power under
conditions of ordinary minimum
flow and 22,113,000 horse power
under conditions of ordinary six
months flow. Only about 4,000,000
horse power has been harnessed.

The first Canadian woman Sen-
ator, Hon. Cairine McKay Wilson,
is the mother of eight children
ranging in age from 20 to 4. Prior
to the appointment there was doubt
as to whether women could legally
be appointed to the Senate and the
question was carried to the Privy
Council which held that women
were persons and therefore entitled
to sit.

About 15% million more a year
are saved to travellers by the
