## Comments

While the Five Power Conference is in session in London considering ways and means of promoting world peace, native organizations under way in Canada for launching another war with relentless fury. Millions of contributions will result from this war which is timed to start in May. It is the war on insect pests in the Dominion which work incalculable damage to trees, plants and crops unless checked by Government entomologists.

Homestead entries in the four western provinces during January and February this year numbered 12,738 as compared with 14,165 for the corresponding period of 1929. Alberta and British Columbia saw no advance while Manitoba and Saskatchewan showed decreases.

Over \$2,000,000 has been invested in manufacturing enterprises in the Province of Alberta and these concerns are paying about \$11,000,000 a year in salaries and wages to over 11,000 employees. Similar rapid development in distribution is now noted in the sister provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

Canadian Pacific Railway Friday night broadcasts are now being sent out across the Dominion from coast to coast. Letters are being received from all parts of Canada in appreciation of the programmes and of the radio receptions in all centres. Arrangements have been made with the National Broadcasting Company of the United States to "see special C. P. R. programmes on the air, early in April, over WJZ to thickly populated sections of the Eastern United States.

Veteran of 65 years railway service and one of Canada's earliest telegraph operators, William Philip Martin, formerly assistant superintendent of the Canadian Pacific Railway, died in Vancouver recently. He learned telegraphy from his father when a boy and became a chief dispatcher at the age of 18.

Discovery of a new species of whitefish in Clear Lake, Manitoba, is announced by A. Hajek of Manitoba University. The new species has been named Coregonus Odontoschilus, in honor of Dr. C. H. O'Donnell, formerly of the faculty of Manitoba University. The newly-discovered fish is common in Clear Lake. It lives at a great depth during the summer, coming to the surface only in the spawning season.
