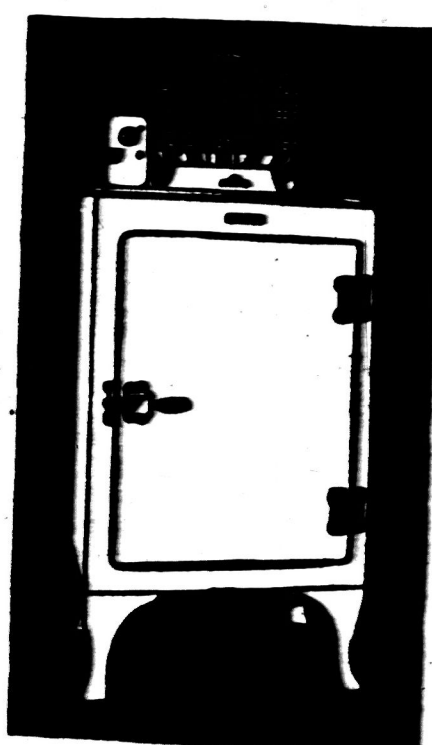

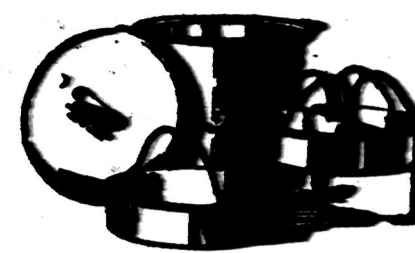
James Hodges, left Tuesday evening for Moose Jaw, Sask. He shipped a carload of horses on Saturday which was accompanied by George Miller.

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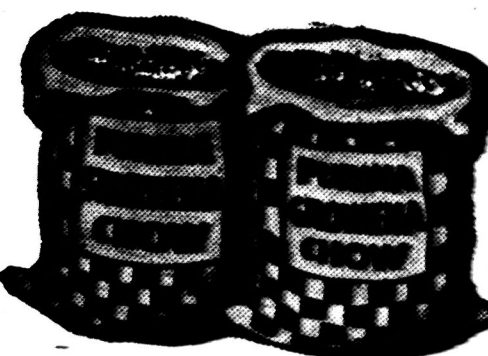
