Cutting Down Travel Time



No matter how anxious travellers may be to spin out their holiday to the ultimate minute they always manifest a certain amount of impatience when once they have left their ship and the formalities of Customs inspection necessitate a slight delay on the pier.
To overcome this the Canada Customs at Montreal and the Canadian Pacific Steamships are co-operating in a new service to incoming passengers. On the four palatial 20,000-ton Duchesse, Duchess of Atholl, Duchess of Bedford, Duchess of Richmond, and Duchess of York, the largest liners to sail direct to Montreal, Customs officers, baggage checkers, and porters board the ship at Quebec. Customs examination of heavy luggage is carried out on the ship during the 10-hour voyage from Quebec to Montreal. Baggage is checked through to its destination and the passenger is enabled to walk off the ship, pause but a moment while hand-baggage is looked over, and proceed direct to the waiting train.

The baggage checkers, customs inspection over, are checking their trunk—judging by the length of the tickets they must be going to Banff, at least.

On June 17th and 18th your Committee and manager of the home attended the Convention of Managers of the Homes for Aged and Infirm, at Simcoe and were greatly impressed by the different Managers and other speakers.

Good Roads Committee Report.
To the Warden and Members of the County Council:—Gentlemen, we, Your Good Roads Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. We have examined the pay-lists and accounts and recommend that they be paid.

2. The Warden and Chairman of this Committee made a careful survey of Police Villages and Hamlets on County Highway System for an application of dust laying material. The area to be sprayed is approximately 44,565 square yards at an estimated cost of \$1,400.00.

3. Would recommend that we advertise for tenders in the Contract Record (2 insertions) for 2 miles of bituminous top on Road 12, east of Hagersville.

4. The ditching and shoudering is well under way and will be completed as fast as weather conditions will permit.

5. Road No. 11 in the Township of Dunn has been resurfaced from Port Maitland to Byng.

6. The Superintendent received from Mr. William Shipway a signed agreement to give the County what land will be required for approaches to Murdoch culvert for the sum of twenty-five dollars, providing the County will construct a wire fence on the new line between the roadway and his land on County Road No. 17.

7. Three miles of macadam base has been laid on Road No. 17 in the Township of Canboro.



ONE GOOD RECIPE MAKES A COOK FAMOUS

Much of the appeal in a meal lies in change from the usual. Combined with a simple meal which embraces cold meat and a salad and a desert with iced tea or coffee, the frozen deserts prove most refreshing. While raspberries are in season the following recipe will be found appetizing. Raspberry Mousse:—1 cupful of raspberry juice, 1 cupful of sugar, 1/2 tablespoon of gelatine, 2 tablespoons of cold water, 1 cupful of whipping cream and 2 tablespoons of confectioner's sugar.
Heat raspberry juice and sugar. Soften the gelatine in cold water

and dissolve in the hot liquid. Cool the mixture until it begins to thicken and fold in the cream which has been whipped until stiff and sweetened with the confectioners' sugar. Turn into a mold, pack in ice and salt and let stand for at least three hours. If canned raspberries are used in this recipe less sugar will be needed. Serves six.
