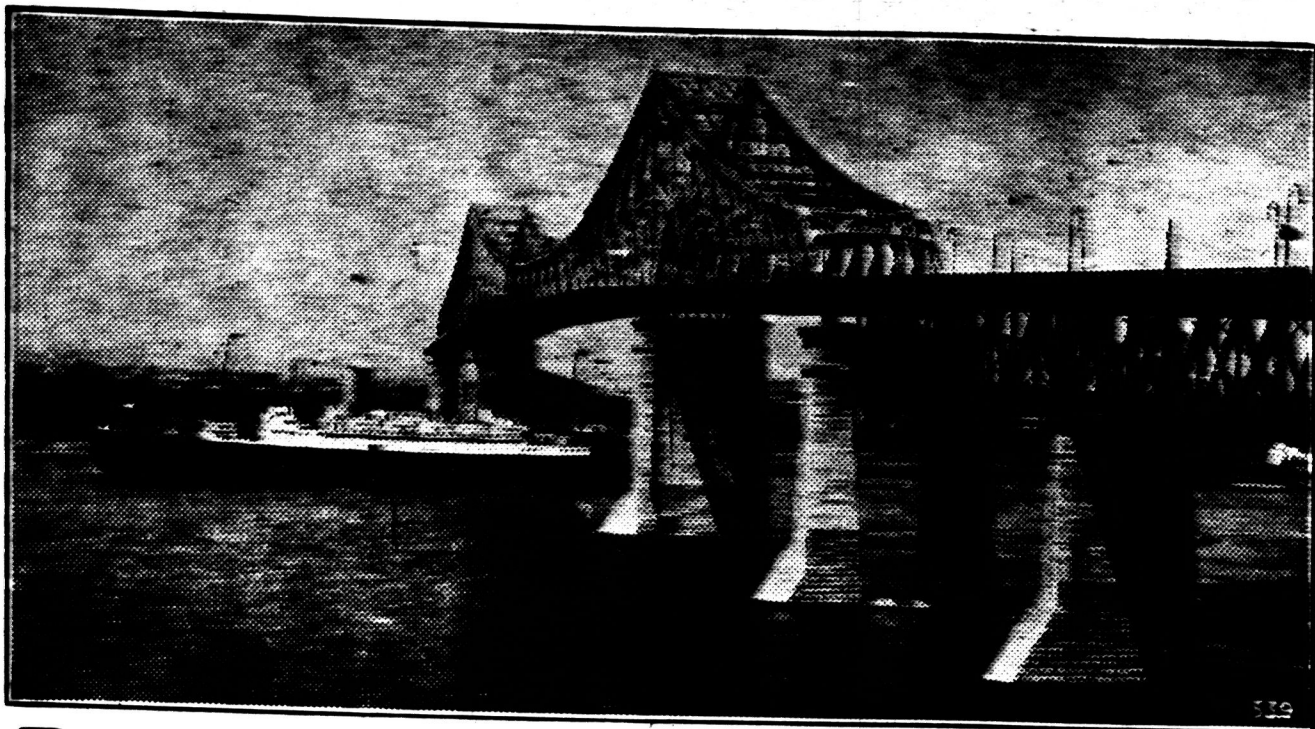

Just as Premier Mackenzie King was formally opening the bridge, the liner passed dramatically beneath it with multi-colored flags fluttering from bow to stern and her ensign dipping in the salute. Then she hailed the bridge with the stentorian "long, two short and long" blasts that herald arrival of Canadian Pacific ships. It is interesting to note that what is seen of the bridge contains the same weight of steel—20,000 tons—as there is in the ship.

## SAFETY DEVICE

Inventors, of whom there are more than are visible to the naked eye at one time, have racked their brains to discover a method of saving the pedestrian who is about to be run over by a motor car. They have been joined in the search by thousands of the pedestrians themselves, not merely in self defence, but because a large portion of ordinary people receive "inspirations" that they are sure are of great value. One of the safety devices recently reported is the brain-child of John R. Valls, of New York, and is a bumper that is described as almost infallible in accident prevention. Bumpers with every conceivable form of scoop or fender effect have been tried, without much success; but with this one, a canvas apron, released when coming in contact with a pedestrian, carries the jay-walker along until the car stops. The device embodies a bumper mounted movably so as to be retracted when struck, and a frame carrying an apron, or other receptacle, normally held in a locked position, which is released by the retraction of the bumper. The apron snaps forward on impact. This affair is said to be as effective with trucks as with passenger cars, and to be an aid in reducing fatal accidents. A similar device, invented by a Winnipeg man was exhibited in Western Canada a year ago.

The whole problem of unemployment will be approached from a radically different angle in the near future and immense savings to both labor and industry are anticipated result.
