OBITUARY

MRS. CHAS. F. HOWARD

After a severe illness of several weeks there passed away on August 3rd, 1930, at her late home, 304 Springvale, Mabel Parkinson, beloved wife of Chas. F. Howard, in her 44th year. The late Mrs. Howard was a twin daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Parkinson, she was born on the farm "Home Comfort," one mile east of Jarvis, on April 1st, 1887, where she lived until March, 1912. Her parents retired from farm life and moved to Jarvis. During these years she was a very active and useful girl both at home and in the church. She became an expert "butter-maker" and won many first prizes at Hamilton and Toronto Fairs.

On September 18, 1912, she was united in marriage to C. F. Howard of Springvale, who survives her. The sudden death of her only son, Lawrence, who was drowned when but five years old, seemed a very hard blow to her, and she has not been in real good health since.

The funeral was held from her late home on Wednesday, August 6th, at 2 p.m., the service being conducted by the Rev. E. W. Brearley, Hamilton, Rev. J. Aiken being away on his vacation.

The text chosen by Rev. Brearley was "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ." During his discourse he made special mention of the faithfulness and good work done by the deceased in the Springvale United Church and vicinity, where she had spent all her married life.

\$10,000 FIRE DESTROYS FARMER'S BUILDINGS

Reading afternoon about 3 p.m. fire broke out in the straw stack on the farm belonging to Mr. G. Deaser, about half a mile west of Jarvis. Threshing was under way at the time the fire started. The definite cause of the fire is not certain, but a piece of metal went through the threshing machine just previous and it is thought that the friction caused sparks which were carried by the blower into the straw. Mr. Deaser had just come off of the stack a few minutes before to start to clean up the floor.

The Jarvis Fire Department was called into action, but as usual, their fire engine had no effect on the flames. Everyone showed a willingness to help, and the stock and machinery was all saved, although the intense heat soon drove everyone back.

The barn was the first building to burn and from there the fire spread rapidly into the hog and sheep pen, then into the hen house and then wiped out the implement shed.

The building were insured for \$3,000, but the estimated loss will be about \$10,000. There were 75 tons of hay, 2 tons of pressed straw, 3,000 bushels of grain, just threshed, and 15 acres of unthreshed alfalfa.

This is the second fire that Mr. Deaser has suffered from. Twenty two years ago fire destroyed all his buildings, and the loss was enough to discourage anyone, but Mr. Deaser is a very optimistic man and through hard work with a progressive spirit behind it he rebuilt his home. He told of how he had lost valuable stock since that, of sickness in the home, but through it all he progressed and made money. We cannot help but admire the optimistic spirit of Mr. Deaser who informed the writer this time next year would see a new set of building on the place where the old ones stood.
