Ever since the beginning of time there has been a weak side in humanity. The real cause of this weakness is selfishness. No sin was ever committed but that there was a selfish desire behind it. 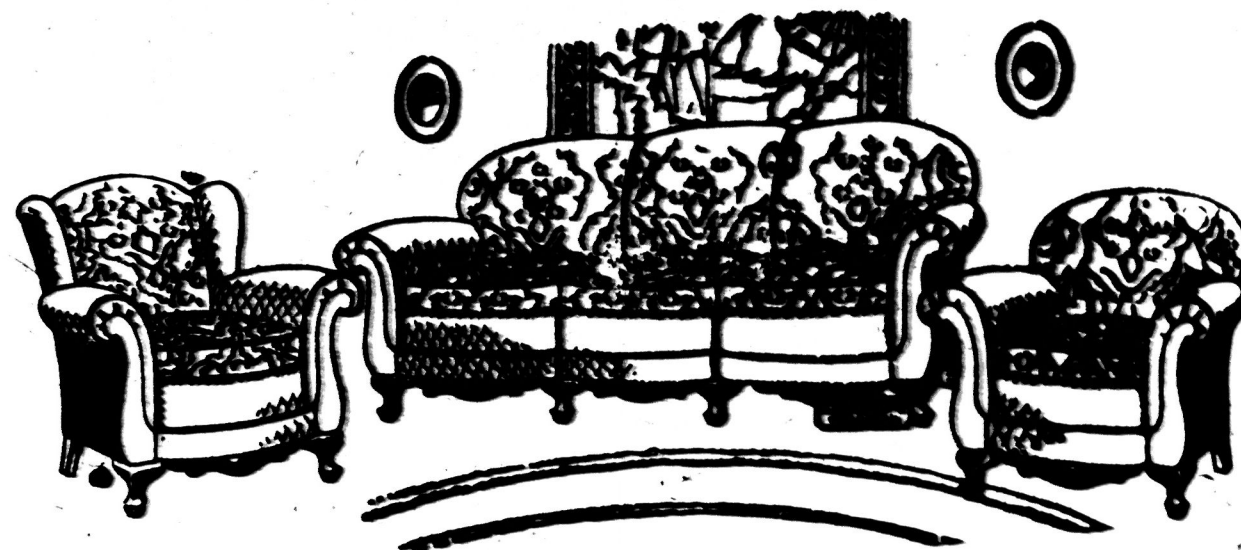
