### RULES AND REGULATIONS

1.—All competition for the following prizes will be  
open to the world except when otherwise specified in  
the prize list.

2.—The annual membership fee will be \$1.00. Each  
exhibitor must purchase a member's ticket before mak-  
ing entries, a registered firm being regarded as one  
exhibitor. Each ticket will entitle the member to make  
20 entries, except in horses, all over 20 entries 5c each.  
Only one member of the firm will be admitted to the  
grounds on the ticket that entitles the member to com-  
pete, and in no case will the ticket be transferable.

3.—All entries must be made at least one day  
previous to the day of the fair, and all articles intended  
to be exhibited in the halls must be placed before 11  
a.m. Judging same will start at one o'clock p.m. sharp.  
Positively no entries taken after 11 a.m. each day of  
Fair.

4.—Every animal, fowl, article, product and chattel  
exhibited must be the actual bona fide property and  
belong absolutely to the person or persons entering or  
exhibiting the same. In the case of every article,  
product or chattel exhibited, other than live stock, the  
said article, product or chattel must be actual produc-  
tion, growth or manufacture, as the case may be, of  
the person or persons owning and exhibiting the same.

5.—In the event of doubt as to any exhibitor hav-  
ing complied strictly with the provisions of Rule 4,  
or in the case of notice that an exhibitor has not  
strictly complied with the provision of the said Rule 4,  
the committee, consisting of the President, 1st Vice-  
President and 2nd Vice-President, or any two of them,  
shall be obliged to cause any exhibitor with refer-  
ence to whom such doubt exists, or with reference  
to whom any such notice has been given, to make a statu-  
tory declaration of a compliance with the terms of  
said Rule 4.

6.—Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or  
dishonest practice, either in the preparation of or by  
any misrepresentation concerning an article or prop-  
erty exhibited which may have effected, or which  
was intended to effect, or the discovery of any decep-  
tion as to the actual ownership of the article or prop-  
erty exhibited, or as to the person growing, produc-  
ing or manufacturing any such article or property, or  
upon the discovery of any fraud, deception or dis-  
honest practice by any person or persons exhibiting  
or by any person upon his or her behalf or in his or  
her interest, the Board of Directors shall withhold  
the payment of the prize awarded, as well as any and  
all other prizes awarded to any person or persons  
shown to have been in collusion with the exhibitor,  
or to have acted improperly on his or her behalf and  
shall prohibit any such person or persons above re-  
ferred to from exhibiting any class for one year or  
more, and may publish the name of such person if  
deemed expedient.

7.—All articles intended for competition must be  
entered in strict accordance with the Prize List in  
order to secure a prize, and the exact number or quan-  
tity stated in the Prize List being strictly adhered to.  
And any entry disqualified under this rule shall be  
marked with a card of disqualification by the Super-  
intendent of the department.

8.—Cattle, sheep and pigs must be on the grounds  
and confined in pens or yards provided for same by 1  
o'clock p.m. on the day of the Fair. None of the  
above animals shall be allowed to compete in more  
than one class or section except in cases of specials,  
or when shown in pens or herds.

9.—Horses—All horses must be on the grounds by  
1 o'clock p.m. on the second day of the Fair, and made  
secure by those in charge of same. Owners comply-  
ing with such minor regulations for their safe com-  
munity and fair and complete exhibition as the com-  
mittee of management may suggest on the day of  
the show. Horses shown singly cannot compete in  
teams, except for specials. Brood mares with foal at  
foot or sufficient evidence of having lost it, and three-  
year-old colts may be exhibited both in harness and  
by the halter. All other colts to be exhibited on the  
halter only. All horses shown in harness must be  
hitched to a vehicle suitable to the class.

10.—Persons exhibiting pure-bred stock must give  
their names and numbers to the Secretary at the  
time of making entries. For young animals the name  
of the animal and those of sire and dam may be  
accepted for those under one year. Certificates of  
registration must be produced for all animals when  
they are shown. In all breeding classes of live stock,  
male animals must be pure bred. No others will draw  
prize money.

11.—Miscellaneous manufacturers, carriages, etc.,  
must be exhibited by the manufacturer or agent.  
Any person making entries as agents for more than  
one producer must pay the regular subscriptions for  
each of such parties, except in agricultural imple-  
ments and musical instruments, which, there being no  
premiums awarded, an authorized agent may exhibit  
for the firm he represents.

12.—Exhibitors of horses, cattle and sheep must  
bring them forward when called for by the judge from  
the judging ring, otherwise they will not be con-  
sidered.

13.—No article or animal deemed unworthy or un-  
healthy shall be awarded a premium. The judge may  
award any grade of premium according to merits of  
the animal or article.

14.—No person shall be allowed to enter for an  
exhibition more than one specimen in any section or  
class unless additional article be of distinct named  
variety or pattern from the first. This rule shall not  
apply to animals, but to all kinds of grain, vegeta-  
ble products, fruit, manufactured articles, etc., in  
which each additional specimen would be precisely  
similar to the first.

15.—No person shall be judge of any article in  
any class in which they are interested as an exhibi-  
tor, agent or employee of an exhibitor or otherwise.

16.—No person or persons shall be allowed to  
interfere with the judges while engaged in making  
their award, either by conversation or any other  
pretence, under penalty of forfeiting all prizes to  
which they might otherwise be entitled, and will be  
promptly excluded from competition. Judges or of-  
ficers are particularly requested to report any breach  
of this rule to the Executive Committee of the Ex-  
hibition who shall be the sole judges of whether or  
not the parties complained of are guilty.

17.—Any person who shall attempt to interfere  
with the judges while in the discharge of their duties,  
or shall, on the premises, use any contemptuous or  
abusive language to any judge or officer of the As-  
sociation, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to  
which he might be entitled, and shall be excluded  
from exhibiting for one year hereafter.

18.—The decision of the judge or judges to be  
final as to the awarding of prizes, and no appeal  
shall be considered except in cases of protest. All  
protests shall be made in writing and shall be so  
delivered within two hours of the award at the sec-  
retary's office.

19.—Any exhibitor or interested person making  
such protest shall be required to deposit the sum of  
\$1.00, and if said protest is not sustained the said  
amount shall be retained by the Association. The  
President, Vice-President and Second Vice-President  
shall constitute a committee to determine such pro-  
test.

20.—No person or persons shall be allowed to dis-  
play any badges or tickets secured at any other Fair  
until such time as the awards have been made.

21.—Grain must be the growth of the current year.  
Grass seeds must be the product of the current or  
previous year.

22.—No animal or article exhibited shall be re-  
moved from the grounds until after four o'clock in the  
afternoon of the second day of the exhibition.

23.—No person shall be allowed to drive or ride  
horses on the show grounds faster than a walk, ex-  
cept within the exhibition ring, under penalty of im-  
mediate removal from the exhibition grounds.

24.—Exhibitors whose tickets have not been de-  
livered heretofore will find entry cards and member's  
tickets ready for them at the office of the secretary  
on the Fair grounds on the day of Fair.

25.—All persons exhibiting shall be deemed to do  
so subject to these rules and regulations, and any  
violation on their part shall forfeit all prize money to  
which they would otherwise be entitled.

26.—Diligence will be used by the officers of the  
Association to ensure the safety of articles sent to  
the Exhibition and to prevent injury or loss to ani-  
mals, but the owners themselves must take the risk  
of exhibiting, and should any articles be accidentally  
injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will render all  
assistance in their power towards its recovery, but  
will not make any payment of value thereof, or be  
otherwise liable.

27.—The Directors of the Society reserve the right  
to pay a percentage of premiums in case of bad  
weather.

#### PREMIUMS

The Treasurer will be prepared to commence pay-  
ing the premiums within two weeks of the close of  
the Show, and persons having prizes awarded to them  
will apply personally or send written orders. All  
premiums not applied for previous to the first of De-  
cember shall be forfeited.

#### MEMBERSHIP TICKETS
