Y. P. A. of Knox Church

The Y. P. A. of Knox Presbyterian church held their regular meeting on Friday evening last. Mr. John Brown, the president was in the chair and Miss Mabel Evans presided at the organ. The scripture lesson was read by Mr. Beverly Evans. Mr. Bingleman offered prayer. The topic "How to make others happy" was taken by Mr. Tom. Wright who gave a very good paper. After which a number took part in the discussion including Courtney Bingleman, Miss Armstrong, Miss Crawford, Evan Bingleman and Dillwyn Evans. Mr. Bingleman and the Pastor also contributed to the discussion and all were very pleased with the way the topic was handled.

Canada Refuses U. S. Immigrants.

Immigration into Canada has increased as a result of unemployment in the United States. A record for rejection of persons desiring to enter Canada was established in August, the peak month of tourist traffic, when 1,123 persons were refused admission at Niagara Falls alone. The total was only 501 the previous year and the August figure is said to be the record for Canada.

Entries into Canada comprise 3 types; tourists, workers seeking employment and Canadians returning to resume residence in this country. Officials of the international bridges at Niagara Falls report a decrease of at least 35 percent from last year's figures in the number of automobiles bringing temporary visitors into Canada during the season just closed. This figure would seem to be the natural result of existing business conditions. Canadian police officers reported a greater number of tourists seeking assistance. According to the official figures issued by the Department of National Revenue at Ottawa at the beginning of September, 1,474,610 American automobiles entered the province of Ontario during the first six months of this year, and the expenditures of these tourists while here is estimated at \$21,455,000. Of these tourists cars 1,287,576 were admitted to the province for a period not exceeding 24 hours; 186,730 for a period not exceeding 60 days; and 304 came in for tours ranging between two and six months.

Windsor, as usual, was the biggest port of entry with 488,701 cars of the first class, 58,937 of the second class and 95 of the third. Bridgeburg was second with 395,606 one-day cars; 48,823 of the second type and 80 of the two month description. Niagara Falls was third; with 270,466; 44,393; and 21 cars, respectively of the three classes.

County Council Held Their Final Meeting For 1930

The county Council met on Thursday, December 4th, with all members present and the Warden in the chair. Moved by Mr. Colter, seconded by Mr. McDonald, that the minutes of the last meeting be taken as read and adopted.

The following communications were then read. Letter from Colter and Colter, re: repairs to building occupied by goaler, rented from Mrs. Quinsey.

Letter from Chas. Buck, re: accident on county roads. Letter from Clerk of Bruce county enclosing resolution that the Attorney General of Ontario be requested to so amend the Mother's Allowance Act that mothers with one child may be eligible for assistance under this act.

Letter from County Clerk, County of York, enclosing similar resolution. Letter from Toronto General Hospital, that Fred Watts, R. E. No. 4, Hagersville, has been admitted as an indigent patient.

Letter from County Clerk, County of Frontenac, that the Prime Minister of Canada be asked that the Dominion of Canada assume full responsibility for payments under the Old Age Pensions Act.

Report of the Inspector of Gaols that the stairway in the gaol leading to the cells in the upper story be widened.

Moved by Mr. Colter, seconded by Mr. Furry, that the report of the Home Committee be received and read.

HOME COMMITTEE REPORT. To the warden and members of the county council, Gentlemen, We your Home Committee met at the Home on Dec. 3, and beg leave to submit the following report:—

We have checked over the accounts of the Children's Aid and the Home for the month of November and find them correct and have handed them to the Finance Committee for payment.

The verandahs of the home have been enclosed with glass which adds greatly to the appearance of the Home.

The inmates of the Home were treated to tobacco and candy on Thanksgiving Day by the Hindoo Kooch Grotto of Hamilton.

There are at present 28 inmates, 11 females and 17 males. Health of inmates, good.

All of which is respectfully submitted. Archie McDonald, chairman.

Moved by Mr. Laidlaw, seconded by Mr. Lockie, that the report of the Home Committee be adopted. Crd.

Moved by Mr. Kett, seconded by Mr. Jensen, and resolved that the members of the County Council of the County of Haldimand in session assembled desire to record and express their regret at the death of Alexander Dunnet of the Township of Oneida who died on November 11, 1930, an ex-member of this County Council.

The deceased was born in the Township of Oneida in 1855 where he lived practically all of his life. Mr. Dunnet was Reeve of Oneida Township in 1908 and 1909. His wide experience and sterling integrity and good judgment made him a valued and useful member, while his pleasant manner and generous nature caused him to be held in the highest personal esteem.

Resolved that this resolution be placed upon the minutes of the council and that a copy thereof be forwarded to the family of the deceased as an expression of our appreciation of the qualities of the deceased, our sincere regret at his death and also of our sympathy with them in their sorrow.

Carried. A by-law was passed granting a franchise to the Union Natural Gas Company of Canada.

Good Roads Committee Report. We have audited the accounts and pay-lists submitted by the Superintendent and recommend that they be paid.

The season's work was completed on December 1st and the machinery has been stored in County shed at Hagersville for the winter.

The expenditure on the County Highway System from January 1st, 1930, to Dec. 1st, 1930 is \$266,665.13

The Superintendent will prepare in detail the annual report covering expenditure during the period January 1st, to Dec. 1st, and submit at the inaugural meeting of the Council of 1931.

The Superintendent's books will be ready for the auditor immediately after the close of the present year.

The Committee, accompanied by the Warden, Inspecting Engineer and Superintendent made a careful inspection near close of season of all roads on the County Highway System, also all bridges on boundary line. Thos. Jepson, chairman.

Moved by Mr. McDonald, seconded by Mr. Furry, that the report of the Good Roads Committee be adopted as read. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Furry, seconded by Mr. McDonald, that the County road change be laid over for the Council of 1931 to deal with. Carried.

SALMON FOUND IN LAKE ERIE WATERS

Species believed to be Sock-Eyes Caught in Increasing Numbers in Port Dover District—Department will be asked to investigate possibilities.

Slowly but surely Lake Erie has been depleted of herring and whitefish during the past few years owing to the increasing number of fishing craft engaged in the industry, until the 1930 season has been the most un-remunerative in the history of fishing operations on this lake. However, it would seem as if Lake Erie is "coming back," and thereby hangs a tale—the square-ended tail of a newcomer among the fish of Lake Erie.

Fifteen years ago one fish of this species was caught of the Haldimand County shore and it excited much curiosity among the fishermen, who were unable to classify it, but were of the opinion that it was a salmon of some kind. Since then, from year to year, an occasional fish of the species has been caught, the catch averaging about one a month for the fishing season. This year the fish have become more plentiful, the highest catch for any one day, in the pound nets of A. B. Hoover at Nanticoke, has been six. The pound nets of W. F. Kolbe & Co. of Port Dover have yielded a few of the species during 1930.

Expert opinions vary, one claiming that the fish are "steelhead" salmon, while another states just as positively that they are Atlantic salmon. The consensus among fishermen here is that they are the true "sockeye" salmon, judging by the firm, pink flesh, the square tail and the size of the eggs. Beyond the shadow of doubt they are not Atlantic salmon, if the positive negations of fishermen who formerly operated out of Nova Scotian and New Brunswick fishing ports are to be taken as authoritative.

Be the fish what they may, they are in a highly edible class, and efforts are being made to have the matter fully investigated by those in charge of their prosecution under the most favorable conditions.
