## OBITUARY

### ALEXANDER MILLER

On Friday, June 27th, at his home in Port Dover, in his 93rd year, Alexander Miller passed to the Great Beyond.

Deceased was the fifth son of the late Robert Miller and Margaret Wages, and was born at Frowick, in the County of Caithness, Scotland, on June 15th, 1838.

Early in life he was apprenticed to the tailoring trade, but shortly after completing his apprenticeship, he enlisted in the Merchant Marine coastal service and followed shipping until coming to Canada in 1860. At that time along with three brothers, took up their home in Port Dover, and shortly after arrival he was given command of one of the many lake schooners sailing from that Port at that time, and continued as a Master Mariner until 1866, when along with his brothers they purchased a farm in the Township of Walpole, and followed farming continuously thereafter.

Deceased was twice married, his first wife being Mary Brown, who died in 1863, leaving three children, Robert J., the eldest passed away in Port Dover some twelve years ago; John B. Miller, living in Pittsburg, and Jennie, the wife of Fredrick S. Second, of Hamilton. His second wife Elizabeth Gilbertson, also a native of Caithness, Scotland, is still living and enjoying good health.

Deceased was for many years and until his death, a devout member and an Elder in Knox Presbyterian Church Port Dover, from which body he will be sadly missed. A staunch Liberal in politics and a true follower of the late George Brown, and Sir Oliver Mowatt, who also was fellow Caithnessmen, he had been a reader of the "Globe" for seventy years.

The funeral was held from his late residence on Monday with interment in Port Dover Cemetery, the service being conducted by Rev. G. L. Evans of Jarvis, assisted by the Rev. Byron Simmons, also of Jarvis, who both spoke highly of the honorable christian character of the deceased. The funeral was very largely attended.

The pallbearers were six nephews, Jos. Gilbertson of Simcoe, Robert Miller, R. Emerson Miller, Andrew Miller, Geo. O. Miller, and Geo. L. Miller of Jarvis.
