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INCREASING ALFALFA YIELDS.

Satisfactory yields of alfalfa are fairly common in many parts of Ontario, yet many farmers are anxious to find means of strengthening the crop and increasing the production of this highly valuable legume. It is a well known fact that alfalfa makes use of a large amount of potash, but just what quantities of suitable fertilizers will be best is the question that many practical farmers of Haldimand would like to know.

Is an attempt to answer this important question a very interesting test has been laid down by the Dept. of Chemistry, O. A. C., in co-operation with Mr. A. G. Skinner, Agriculture Representative, Cayuga. This test is located on the farm of Mr. J. E. Vanderburg, west of Elnora, on No. 5 Highway.

HOPE TO ABSORB ALL UNEMPLOYMENT

Canadian industry is following closely the progress of unemployment relief legislation adopted by the Government of the United States, it is stated by Government officials here. So far, though the unemployment situation in Canada has reached the serious stage, no comprehensive attempt at relief has been made.

Press dispatches from the United States show that the whole country

is aroused to the problem and that determined efforts are being made to remedy it. Large public works and construction schemes have been undertaken in order to produce employment. With the advance of the season it is expected that the jobless American will be reabsorbed in his old pursuits, said James J. Davis, United States Secretary of Labor recently.

"It is absolutely necessary to our national prosperity," said Mr. Davis "that we set before us a goal, regular employment, at liberal wages for all our working population."
