## Holidays on Horseback in West



Year by year the idea of Dude Ranching as a holiday recreation that really means re-creation, is taking greater hold on young and old alike all over the continent. Horseback riding, trail riding, taking part in rodeos—if you are a good enough cowboy—but anyone on horseback from morning to night, that is the way to harden the muscles and bodies of people who have gone soft in the enervating life of cities. This totally different kind of a holiday is offered in any of half a dozen Dude Ranches in the Alberta foothills and the Rockies. There is the historic Elbow Ranch, owned by Mrs. "Bill" Brewster; the T. S. Ranch, operated by Guy Woodick; the Lake Windermere Girls Camp and the E. Y. Ranch, recently opened by Miss Emily Yates of Montreal, to name a few. The holiday-maker attires him or herself in weird and wonderful cowboy outfit from high-heeled boots and chaps to ten-gallon hat and tries out everything—roping and tying calves, packing mules and ponies and learning all the mystery of the ancient craft of knot-tying, riding the mountain trails and sleeping out o' nights—just a real western open-air holiday. Last year shows typical scenes from the Kananaskis Ranch Society hosts hog-tying a calf; a party of riders all set for a day's riding and a glimpse of the exciting business of roping a tepee.

## COUNT ASSUMES RIGHTS OF PARENTS

Canada's attitude towards the delinquent children has undergone a radical change during the past thirty years, government records here show all legislation recently placed on the statutes affecting the treatment of such children has set up a method of procedure which is declared to be distinctly beneficial in its effect.

All delinquent children are now regarded to be in need of the care and protection of the Juvenile Court. This court assumes the rights of parents who are unwilling or unable to discharge their obligation. Social investigations are made by probation officers. Physical and mental examinations are made by experts.

Scientific treatment with regard to education and guidance is held to be more effective than discipline and punishment.

Low wages, "blind alley occupations", lack of vocational and professional training, physical and moral hazards involved in labor are all inducements to delinquency, the records show.

The Stewart reunion which was held at Peacock Point last Saturday, was a great success and was largely attended. A rug donated by Mrs. Bob Dalby was won by a visitor from Detroit. The afternoon was spent in games and sport. After a banquet the clan gathered together and had a reunion group picture. The honor of being the oldest Stewart is held by Michle Stewart, age 83 years, and the youngest one on the grounds was Mrs. Shaver's baby, age three months. Relatives from a distance attending the reunion were from Detroit, Cleveland, Buffalo, California, Toronto, St. Thomas, Hamilton and Simcoe. The reunion next year will be held the first Saturday in August.

## C. & B. LINE OPEN CLEVELAND TO PORT STANLEY DIVISION

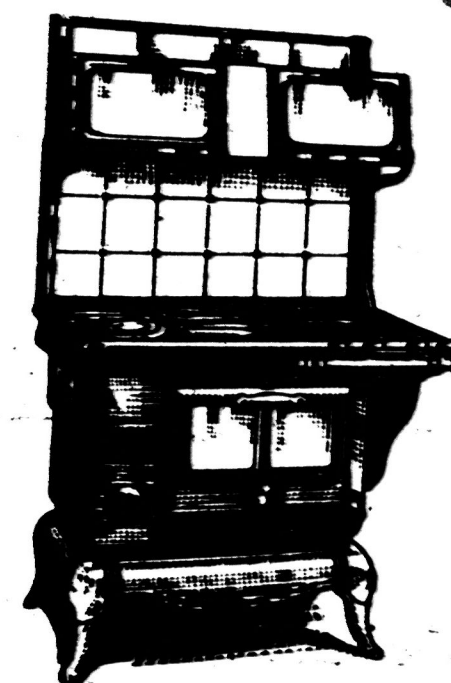

## HEALTH SERVICE

### BRAIN FOOD

There is a popular belief that certain foods, notably fish, are brain foods, and it is thought that the free use of such foods will, in some way, improve the brain tissue and so increase the mental ability.

There is no evidence that any particular food, such as fish, or that the use of foods containing any special constituent, such as phosphorus, affects, in any way, the mental development of the human being.

It must be remembered that all parts of the body are dependent. The proper nutrition of one part implies proper nutrition of all other parts. If the diet is deficient in one or another essential, the whole body suffers, although some part or tissue may show the ill effects sooner than others.

It is important that the brain be properly nourished. This cannot happen if the blood supply is interfered with. If the heart is not pumping properly, if the blood cells are abnormal, if the blood is not getting rid of the waste material it picks up from the tissues—if one or more of such abnormal conditions occur, the brain tissue suffers, together with all the other tissues which go to make up the body.

In order to have the tissues of the body healthy, we must live a hygienic life. We must eat the proper foods and secure fresh air and sunshine, we must rest and play, and live what is described as a hygienic life. A hygienic life is a well-rounded existence wherein sufficient attention is given to all the needs of the body. In such an existence, the individual does not over-do one thing and neglect another, but balances all the needs, giving to each a reasonable amount of attention.

We are not all born equal in a sense that we all have the same physical and mental capacities. We vary a great deal, and what we should strive for is to develop, to the full, the capacities with which we are born. If we are in a condition of health, then we have achieved our aim.

In seeking to secure this development, we find that the hygienic life plays a considerable part. We cannot increase our brain capacity by eating any particular food, but we can help our brain tissue to be in a condition of health by paying attention to the general health needs of the body.
