LEWIS N. PARSONS PASSES TO HIS REST

Retired M. C. R. Official Had Long and Honorable Railroad Career

Lewis N. Parsons, one of the best known and most popular officials on the Michigan Central Railway, passed away at his home, 63 Roseberry Place, St. Thomas, early Friday afternoon. Mr. Parsons had been in poor health for some weeks, his condition having necessitated his retirement on superannuation. Only last Monday he was waited on by his former fellow-workers and presented with a purse of gold as a token of their regard.

Mr. Parsons was born at Jarvis 63 years ago and spent forty years in the service of the M. C. R., first as operator and later as chief operator. He held that position in Windsor until 1911, when he came to St. Thomas as chief for the division. He continued in that capacity until his retirement.

The deceased had played a very active part in the affairs of his associates on the road. He held certificate No. 1 as an honorary member of the Order of Railway Telegraphers, an organization in which he filled all the important local offices at one time or another. He was also prominent in the affairs of the M. C. R. Pioneers' Association, being president two years ago. At the time of his death he was the president of the Railroad Hospital Association.

A man of retiring disposition and pleasing manner, Mr. Parsons had a host of friends among citizens other than railroaders, and his death will be deeply regretted. His wife, one daughter, Mrs. Fred R. Palmer, and one brother, John J. Parsons, survive.
