### MARK SENN HALDIMAND VICTOR

The results of the election on Monday last caused no surprise in this County as it was conceded that Mr. Mark Senn would win out, which he did with an increased majority over his Liberal opponent, W. W. Camelford.

The contributing factors in the result being industrial depression and the condition of the dairy industry.

The ever increasing popularity of the Conservative Candidate in this County was shown by the result of the polling. Both parties were well organized and a hard clean fought battle resulted as stated above. The majority being about 1400.

The sweeping Conservative victory over the Dominion speaks well for the ability of the leader, the Hon. R. B. Bennett, and the people will await with much interest the putting into effect of his Canada First policy and the welding together of the different provinces in one great unit to keep for our Canadian people their rightful heritage.

### EMPLOYMENT IS MAJOR ISSUE

OTTAWA, ONT.—Labor circles here evince great interest in the attitude of the United States government as regards unemployment made public by Francis I. Jones, Director-general of Federal Employment Services, Washington, D. C.

Finding employment for persons out of work is a necessary function of the government, says Jones. The burden should no longer be permitted to rest upon the laborer. Industry as well as society in general will benefit from this governmental shouldering of the responsibility, it is declared. "The dealing with the human element of industry, the movement of labor and the protection of its rights should not be left to profit-seeking organizations or fee-charging private employment agencies" Jones asserted.

For the unskilled and semi-skilled worker there should be free service and information.

The whole problem of unemployment will be approached from a radically different angle in the near future and immense savings to both labor and industry are the anticipated result.
