

EMPLOYMENT IS MAJOR ISSUE

OTTAWA, ONT:-Labor circles here evince great interest in the attitude the past few weeks, but we hope of the United States government as regards unemployment made public by Francis I. Jones, Director-general of Federal Employment Services, Washington. D. C.

Finding employment for persons out of work is a necessary function of the government, says Jones. The burden should no longer be permitted to rest upon the laborer. Industry as well as society in general will benefit from this governmental shouldering of the responsibility, it is declared. "The dealing with the human element of industry, the movement of labor and the protection of its rights should not be left to profit-earning organizations or fee-charging private employment agencies" Jones asserted.
