HAMILTON ST. THOMAS TRAIN SERVICE TO BE CONTINUED

A meeting had been arranged for June 5th between the Hamilton Chamber of Commerce and C. N. R. Officials to settle the question regarding the discontinuation of the Hamilton and St. Thomas train. A letter to this effect was received by the Jarvis Board of Trade and they were invited to attend. In the meantime word was received from the Officials that the cancellation was wasted out. The following two letters will explain all the data:

Dear Mr. Brown:—

With reference to the proposed cancellation of the Hamilton to St. Thomas train service.

I received the attached letter from the C. N. R. Officials this morning in which you will note that they have decided not to cancel this service.

Getting Ready for Shriners



Between 30,000 and 40,000 members of the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine will meet in Toronto next June under the leadership of Esten A. Fletcher (nephew), incoming Imperial Potentate of the Order. Hotels of the city, including the Royal York with its 1184 rooms will be insufficient to meet the demand, and the Canadian Pacific Railway is building a city of sleeping cars to accommodate some 8,000 of the Shriners. "Fez City", as it will be called, will cover 21 acres of land and construction data given out show the tremendous scope of the labors. There will be required 115,000 feet board measure in 30 sets of switch ties weighing 210 tons; 12,900 track ties weighing 800 tons; 30 switches weighing 86 tons; 11 1/2 miles of 85-lb. rail weighing 760 tons; 35,000 tie plates weighing 150 tons; 60 tons of rail fastenings; 30 tons of track spikes; 6 tons of track bolts; 18,000 cubic yards of ballasting for tracks; and 9,000 cubic yards of material for 3 1/2 miles of platforms with a breadth of 14 feet. The city will be fitted with modern conveniences and a building 220 by 20 feet wide will accommodate 100 cold and hot showers. Lighting will require 75,000 watts, enough to supply 14 miles of city residential street lighting power. This electrical work will call for 35 miles of wire strung on 229 poles.
