**HOLIDAY HINTS.**

Without taking into account the number that lead to tragedies because of ignorance, carelessness or thoughtless actions, far too many holidays do harm instead of good. People who live in the larger centres of population are very apt to forget that, through the efforts of their health department, they are protected in many ways, day by day, without their having to give any thought to the matter themselves. Such people are accustomed to taking a drink from any tap without fear of danger, to use milk as delivered to them without a thought of impurity, and to eat in restaurants, assured that the food is clean and the dishes sterilized.

It must be remembered, however that as yet public health is not generally developed in the small town and rural areas to the extent that it is in the cities. For this reason, in rural districts, it is not always safe to drink water, use milk and eat in public eating places indiscriminately. There are, without doubt, many country places where proper care is taken, but it is the part of wisdom to inquire and be satisfied that such is the case.

There is not much sense in carefully safeguarding the health of your children at home, and then, at some summer resort, expose them to the dangers of contaminated water and dirty milk. There is more typhoid

fever in the country than in the cities.

A special warning is given to motorists who may be careful when they go away for an extensive holiday, but who, on their short runs, forget that they should be equally careful with regard to their food and drink.

There are some people who attempt to cram everything into a short holiday period. In their desire to get out of their vacation all they can, they lose sight of the fact that their excesses are likely to do them harm instead of good. A holiday does not mean just a "good time;" it is intended for recreation and it is also an opportunity to repair and store up health for the working part of the year.

To start off with a severe sunburn is, for example, a bad beginning; this causes discomfort and puts a stop to the gradual exposure to the sun's rays which is so beneficial.

**FARMERS' WEEK - ONTARIO AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE**

The College will be "at home" to its Farmer Friends in Haldimand for one week starting Monday, June 16

Visitors are advised to arrive early in order to have time to see the big institution. The forenoon may be spent looking about the lawns and gardens or going over the exhibits in the buildings of the Science Departments.

All visitors are requested to bring basket lunch, and to assemble picnic style under the shade trees by the gymnasium (in the gymnasium in case of rain) at 12.00 o'clock sharp, Standard Time. The College will provide hot tea, milk, and ice cream.

After lunch, the men may go in charge of a guide to spend an hour or two looking over the crop experiment plots and the live stock, after which they will be at liberty to visit other departments as they see fit.

After lunch, a guide will conduct the women to Macdonald Institute

where they will be shown through the Home Economics Classroom, women will then be at liberty to visit the Poultry Houses, Dairy, Apiary, and the Gardens at their leisure.

There will be an information bureau in a comfortable, airy room near the gymnasium. Here there will be a supply of bulletins, circulars, etc. on various topics, and copies of these can be had for the asking. Persons in charge will be glad to give information and to direct visitors to any building or department which they may wish to visit. Besides this staff officials will be in all buildings from 10.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. each day, ready to give information on questions of agricultural science and practice.

At 4.00 o'clock the campus will be available to young and old for baseball games, horse-shoe pitching, or such other sports as they may see fit to enjoy.
