POWER

HUNNY SAYS GOODBYE TO HAWKES, SUICIDES
Leader of Byrd Pack Perished Dethronement

New York, April 25.—Polar expeditions have always been replete with deeds of sacrifice. When eight human and 75 dog members of Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd's Antarctic expedition returned to-day from the southern wastes, they bore the saga of "Chinook," the boss husky who committed suicide when he realized that old age would force him to relinquish leadership of the dog pack. This is the story of canine sacrifice.

Reluctant to talk to newspapermen on their own experience, the men crowded around Arthur T. Walden, wind-battered chief dog driver; on the rusty old whaler C. A. Larsen coming up the bay, as he told the story of his favorite dog's suicide.

Tears welled into the eyes of the old Yankee dog master as he told how the aged dog, on his twelfth birthday, bade him good-by and trotted off into the silent wilderness of the Antarctic, never to return.

"Chinook was my partner," he said "I wish I was half as good a man as he was a dog. Everybody loved him, from Commander Byrd down the line.

"He died with his boots on. He went out alone to die on his twelfth birthday because he knew he had run his course. Two days before, three of the pack jumped him. He fought back, but he knew they would get him soon.
