Three Causes of Chicago Racketeering

There are three main causes of racketeering in Chicago and other large cities, and they can easily be summed up as follows:— The World War which instilled into many the use of fire-arms as well as the desire to kill their fellowmen.

Prohibition which has decreased the respect of the law, that is not being enforced, and they know they can buy their way out of any trouble.

The last cause is the failure of immigrants from foreign countries to properly bring up their children to respect the laws of the United States. One paper points out the fact that most all racketeers are Italians with a small number of Jews and Poles. But it can easily be noticed that nine out of every ten murders committed in South Chicago, are committed by people whose name has a foreign origin.

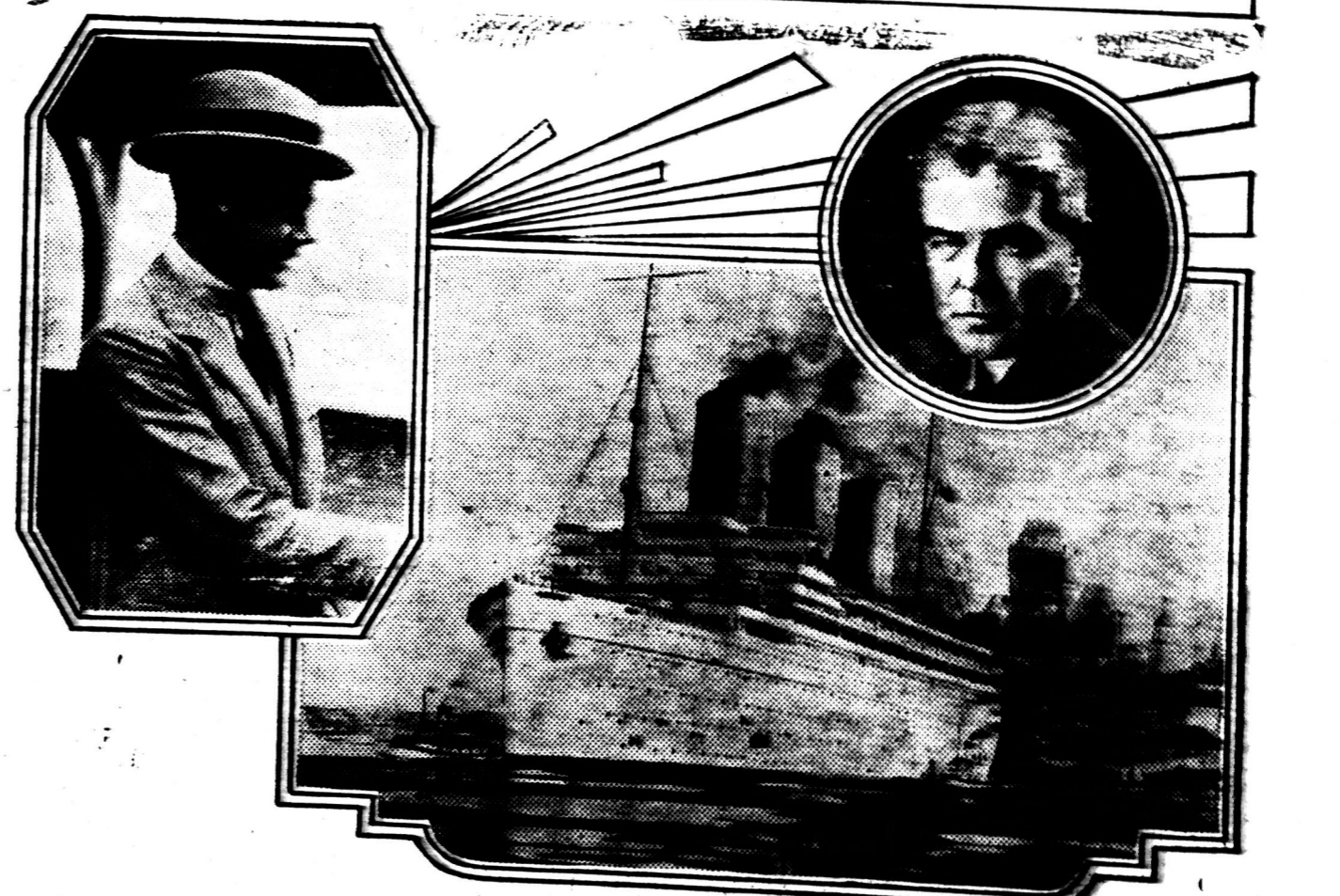
