County Council Minutes
(Continued from last week)

Report of Committees adopted.
H. M. COLEBERRY, Chairman.
Good Roads Committee Report
To the Warden and Members of the County Council.—Your Good Roads Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1. The pay lists and accounts have been audited and found correct and would recommend that they be paid.
2. Your Committee are submitting estimates for your consideration and approval which show an expenditure for maintenance \$100,000.00 also and expenditure for construction of \$100,000.00.

3. Would recommend that we accept the quotations from the Hagersville Quarries Limited, The Hagersville Contracting Co. Ltd., and the Gordon Crushed Stone Co. Ltd., for what stone and screenings the County may wish to purchase from them during the season of 1930. P. O. B. on trucks at their plants at the following prices:— 1-in. stone and larger 70c per ton, 3/4-in. stone and smaller 80c per ton, dust 50c per ton. The above firms agree to ship in hopper cars to any railway siding within the County at the above prices with prepaid freight added. Settlements monthly.

4. Would recommend that all truck hauling on County roads during 1930 be done by owners of trucks residing in the County and the hauling be distributed as equally and fairly as possible, and the rate per ton be 10¢ except in special cases of long haul which can be arranged.

5. Would recommend that the quotation from Mr. Alfred Best of \$2.40 per cubic yard for 1-in. stone and smaller sizes delivered by truck on roads 11 and 12, Township of Dunn and South Cayuga be accepted.

6. Would recommend that this Committee be empowered to accept an offer from Mr. L. E. Gilmore for 3/4-in. stone and smaller sizes for Road No. 11, Division Walpole, or any other road, providing the stone and price is satisfactory.

7. A joint meeting of Wardens, Road Committees, and Superintendents of the Counties of Wentworth, Lincoln, Welland and Hamilton was held at St. Catharines, March 24th, 1930.

The Warden, Chairman of Good Roads Committee, Mr. Glenn and Superintendent, represented this County. Mr. H. Homburger, Chairman of Roads of Lincoln County, acted as Chairman of the meeting. The following resolutions were presented and adopted:— Moved by Mr. Gibson, Wentworth, sec. Mr. Quinn, Lincoln, that this meeting go on record as favouring the sending of a joint deputation from the Counties of Wentworth, Lincoln, Welland and Hamilton to wait upon the Minister of Highways to urge the assumption, by them, of the entire cost of maintenance of Provincial Highways within their borders, and that no cost of reconstruction will be asked for until the debentures on original paving construction have been paid.

Moved by Mr. Emery, Welland, sec. Mr. Lawson, Lincoln, that the Counties of Lincoln, Welland, Wentworth and Hamilton send a deputation to Toronto to interview the Minister of Highways relative to outstanding road problems; that in view of the importance of the questions to be discussed, we suggest that the Premier be invited to attend.

Moved by Mr. Fralick, Lincoln, sec. Mr. Sherk, Haldimand, that the joint Council of the Counties through which a provincial highway is to be designated should be consented as to the route and also as to the type of construction before such final designation or construction.

Moved by Mr. Book, Lincoln, sec. Mr. Kline, Welland, that this meeting is of the opinion that the unpaid portion of debentures issued for County Roads, remaining at the time of assumption as a Provincial Highway should be credited to the County as a payment towards the cost of such provincial highway.

Moved by Mr. Jepson, Haldimand, sec. Mr. Lawson, Lincoln, that the question of allowing interest on temporary loans for County Roads Construction and Maintenance should be discussed with the Minister of Highways with a view to having such interest eligible for provincial subsidy.

Recommendation No. 1.—That the Department of Highways be requested at the direction of the deputation to appoint a commission having in view a finding as to the equitable distribution of costs of all highways within in the Province.

Recommendation No. 2.—That an interviewing committee be appointed from each County to await upon the Minister in connection with the resolutions presented.

An appointment was arranged by Mr. T. J. Mahony, M. P. P., Wentworth, with Mr. Henry, Minister of Highways, for Wed. April 9th, and representatives from the Counties of Wentworth, Lincoln, Welland and Haldimand were present, and were introduced to the Minister by Dr. Berry, M. P. P., Haldimand. The Minister received the deputation very courteously and promised to give the resolutions presented careful consideration.

Committee of the Whole Report.
To the Warden and Members of the County Council.—Gentlemen, We your Committee of the Whole beg leave to report as follows:—

Youth Faces Third Trial for His Life

Accused of Slaying Employers Wife. Charges Police Employed Third Degree.

St. Catharines, Ont., May 3.—The death riddle of Grasse's Corner is still unsolved.

Arthur Grimes, 21-year-old English immigrant, must stand a third trial on a charge of murdering Mrs. Pearl Stewart, wife of his employer.

Twice in the last six months, Grimes' life was hung in the balance and on each occasion a jury has been unable to agree as to his guilt or innocence. If a third deadlock results, the accused youth will go free.

STORY OF CRIME.
Mrs. Stewart's body, the skull crushed in, was found hidden beneath the woodshed of her home in February, 1929. Blood-stained clothing, partially burned, found in the kitchen stove, was identified as belonging to Grimes; and the latter was found hiding in a field a few hours later.

Insisting that the youth was a victim of circumstantial evidence, Peter White, K. C., defence counsel, sought to establish that police had "third degreed" the accused.

Lincoln County jail officials told of an interview which Alfred Cuddy, Deputy Commissioner of provincial police, and John Miller, Chief Inspector, had with Grimes in his cell. Miller, the witness said, had put his arm around Grime's shoulder and told him they were to help him.

TELLS OF TERROR.
Grimes, testifying in his own defence, declared that he had been terrorized into signing an alleged confession, by the belief that the police would shoot him unless he did so. He was unable to say that any definite threat of shooting had been made. He denied all knowledge of the crime.

The defence also contended that James Stewart, the youth's employer, had starved him during the seven years the immigrant had been working on his farm.

Medical evidence was submitted, to establish that Grimes was suffering from under-nourishment and that he had gained weight rapidly on the jail food.

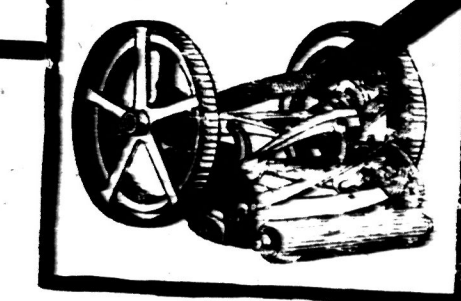
