### Historical Society Meeting at Cayuga

Much information has already been collected by schools and other organizations and it remains to a Historical Society to collect and preserve these facts.

Mrs. Peart sketched briefly the history of the Grand River Settlement and told of different sources from which authentic information could be obtained.

Mr. G. L. Miller in his usual happy manner, introduced the speaker of the day, Dr. W. A. McIntosh of Simcoe, President of the Norfolk Historical Society.
