The above letter was written by a man who has a personality and character worthy of the stimulation and direction he has given to many students in their future out-look on life.
It was my good fortune to be a student under the direction of Dr. Riddell while he was principal of Alberta College, Edmonton, Alta. It was before the Great World War, I went to Alberta College a rough Western Homesteader, desirous of getting a little more education, because my early school days had ended when but a lad of thirteen. At the college I first met Dr. Riddell. No man could have shown greater patience and ability, than he did, in his teachings and instructions to me. While others criticized and wondered what the Dr. could make out of this rough Westerner, he never lost hope in me, but struck faithfully as a true friend. Always willing to help me with my many complicated problems of my matriculation. Although I give great credit to the other Professors in the college, yet Dr. Riddell was ever ready and willing to devote his time to any problem that baffled me. A loving and patient father could not have done more. And so I feel that I cannot pay this great man a large enough tribute for all he has done for me and others.
The World War ended my education and also my personal contact with Dr. Riddell. But in all these years I have never forgotten. I feel greatly honored for tribute, he has paid me in regard to my humble verses written in honor of my beloved Mother.
