After a lingering illness, Elizabeth beloved wife of James Vokes, passed away at her home in Port Dover, on Friday, May 23rd, at the age of 71 years. She was born at Streetsville, Trafalgar Township, and with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Asa Kindree, moved to a farm at Nanticoke, from where on December 17th, 1879, she was married to Jas. Vokes.

Mr. and Mrs. Vokes resided on their Lakeshore farm for many years and 12 years ago retired from active farm life and took up their residence at First Avenue, Port Dover.

On December 17th 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Vokes quietly celebrated their Golden wedding with a small circle of immediate relatives.

The late Mrs. Vokes leaves to mourn her departure, her husband, one son, Stanford Vokes, of Nanticoke one daughter, Mrs. W. E. Wicker, of Port Dover, one sister, Mrs. George Werrett, of Simcoe, and two brothers, Mr. George Kindree, of Hamilton, and Mr. Dan Kindree, of Nanticoke.

Interment took place at Port Dover Cemetery on Sunday afternoon, May 25th, after the service at her late residence.

Mrs. Vokes was a member of the Anglican Church, and Rev. D. J. Cornish, of St. Paul's Church, Port Dover, was the officiating minister.

A large attendance of relatives and friends and many beautiful floral tributes testified to the esteem in which she was held. The Pall bearers being, Mr. David Jepson, of Hamilton, Messrs Thos. and Isaac Jepson, of Hagersville, Abraham Hoover and Wm. Walmsby, of Port Dover, and Geo. L. Miller, of Jarvis.

WILLIAM J. HODGES

Mr. William J. Hodges, of Morrison, Ontario, passed away very suddenly in Toronto on Monday, May 19th. Mr. Hodges left home in his usual good health on Sunday afternoon to resume his regular duties with the C. P. R. at Streetsville. He spent Sunday night in Toronto and planned to go to his work early Monday morning but in the early morning he was discovered dead in bed having passed away during the night.

His remains were interred at Morrison on Thursday afternoon, May 22nd, where the last respects of a very large community of friends, were shown. The flag of the public school was lowered to half mast until after the funeral, and the school was closed that afternoon as a token of the esteem in which he was held in the school section of which he was teacher for nine years.

A very large gathering of friends attended the funeral which was conducted by Rev. Mathews of Duff's Presbyterian Church, interment taking place in Crown Cemetery, Morrison.

Besides his wife, who was Miss Margaret McFarlane, he leaves four sisters: Mrs. Nellie Buck, of Port Dover, Ont. Mrs. L. Gould, of Vanessa, Ont., Mrs. D. Hewson, of London England, and Mrs. F. J.
