Mrs. Alfred Cade passed away at her home 35 King St. Simcoe, early Monday Morning, Oct. 20th. Although in poor health all summer the end came unexpectedly.

Besides her husband there are three daughters, Mrs Genery of Waldole, Mrs. Thos. Gurr, Charlotteville and Miss Elizabeth at home and one son at Vittoria, who mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother.

Mrs. Cade was born in London, England, and leaves there one sister Mrs. Wm. Lloyd, of Billerica, Essex and two brothers, Robert Warren of London and Fred Warren of Sudbury, Suffolk, to mourn her.

The funeral was held on Wednesday, Oct. 22nd. After a short service at the house, then to Trinity Anglican Church for service conducted by Rev. C. K. Masters, thence to the family plot at Oakwood Cemetery.

The Late Robert Oliver Ward.  
(Mortlach, Sask.)

There passed away early Thursday morning one of the oldest pioneers of this district in the person of Mr. R. O. Ward, aged 69 years, 5 months. Deceased had suffered with heart trouble for a number of years. Since the death of his life partner, a few months ago, Mr. Ward has gradually failed in health and about a week ago he was taken seriously ill with pneumonia and kept gradually sinking until the end came possibly on Thursday morning.

Mr. Ward was born near Nantawake Ontario, June 3rd, 1861. He married Emma Hewitt on March 3rd, 1886 and resided on his farm for about six years when he moved to Jarvis, where he was engaged in the implement business. He moved west to Mortlach, Sask., twenty four years ago, and resided there until his death. He had kind and jovial disposition, always ready and willing to help any one in need, and will be sadly missed by a host of friends and neighbors. He leaves behind him his three sons; Charles, Harry and Lloyd and three daughters; Mrs. Fred Armstrong, Mrs. Garfield Hodgins, all of Mortlach, Sask., and Mrs. Duncan Campbell, Winnipeg, Manitoba.

One daughter predeceased him 14 years ago and one son while they were in Ontario. He also leaves four brothers, one sister and nineteen grandchildren.

The funeral was held on Sunday from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Garfield Hodgins, to the Anglican Church, of which the deceased was a life long member. The services were conducted by Rev. H. C. M. Grant.

## Haldimand Plowing Match Proves A Big Success; Record Broken

Over 3000 people attended the second Haldimand County Plowing Match held on Thursday, October 30, on the farm of Mr. Peter E. Reicheld, one mile north of Fisherville.

London skies which occasionally dripped rain failed to dampen the enthusiasm during the whole day. Thirty-six contestants took part with 14 in the Tractor classes and 12 in the Tractor classes. The Officers and Directors were highly pleased with this entry which shows an increase of ten over the first match held last year. One notable feature of the match was the large attendance early in the day. The spectators seemed to be particularly interested in the strike-outs and in spite of the dry condition of the soil, splendid plowing was done. This was particularly true of the tractor and jointer classes. The directors of the Association are stressing these classes and were well pleased with the support they got.

In the men's tractor class, the first prize won by Russell Hare, R. R. 1, Nanticoke, carried with it the Hamilton Dairies' Cup as well as the Canadian Industries Ltd. prize for the best in-and-outs, and the Reicheld special for best plowed land with tractor.

The Mark C. Senn Trophy was won by Freeman Nixon, R. R. 5, Hagersville, who also won the special for the best Crown in Class three.

Ivan Long, R. R. 1, Jarvis, again won the R. F. Miller Challenge Shield in the class for boys under 21 together with the special for the best Crown and the Best Finish.

The class for Tractor in Soil was under 21 years was nicely filled this year with five contestants. The Richmond Shield was won by Harry Thomas of Hagersville who also won the special for best finish.

George Packham, R. R. 1, Gaiter Centre carried off the Royal Bank Trophy in the Two-furrow class and George Garlow, an Indian contestant from Oshwegon, won first prize in the open Jointer class, together with the Canadian Bank of Commerce Trophy.

A new cup offered by Dr. E. N. Berry, M. L. A., in the Jointer class open to Haldimand County only, was won by Frank Woodruff of Hagersville.

The officers and directors are anxious to express their hearty appreciation for the wonderful support accorded them by the donors of cash donations, trophies and goods.

Two hundred people sat down to the banquet held in the evening at the new Parish Hall, Fisherville. The Ladies Aid co-operating with Women's Institute catered and are to be congratulated upon the success of their labors.

A splendid program was arranged for the evening with Mr. R. Sherk, Warden of the County, acting as Chairman. The chief speaker for the evening was Colonel Thompson, a well known lawyer, farmer and native of the County. Short addresses were also given by Mr. N. J. Thomas, of the Department of Chemistry, O. A. C., Mr. A. R. G. Smith, Chief Weed Inspector for Western Ontario and Mr. Elliot Moses, Oshwegon, who is a Director of the Ontario Plowmen's Association.

The president, Mr. Frank Laidlaw and the secretary, A. Gordon Skinner, also spoke briefly and expressed the thanks of the Association to all taking part and assisting, not only with the match, but with the evening's program.

Road No. 12 Townships of South Cayuga and Dunn is under construction. Moccasin base, crushed stone and screenings. Will be completed.
