### Bus Burned.

About five miles north of Caledonia, the bus coming from Hamilton to Caledonia, shortly before 8 o'clock Monday morning, was burned nothing remaining but the chassis. Fire was caused by the heater igniting an umbrella. The fire burned for about two hours and when the gasoline tank took fire the flames went high above the telephone poles and wires. Two guard posts were burned and so intense was the heat that the pavement beneath was quite soft for hours after.

The Caledonia Fire Department was called and although they responded immediately, the fire had spread to such proportion that it could not be brought under control, in spite of the gallant efforts of the firemen. They fought bravely and bravely, standing close to the bus and snarving the hose on its blazing interior, although there was a short time later when the explosion in the tank burst into a complete loss.

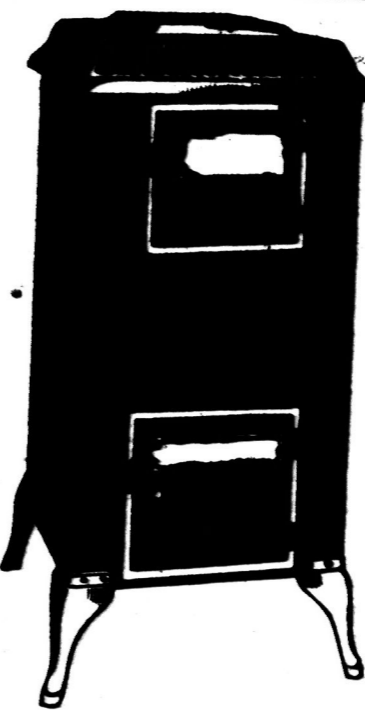
