That Saturday of last week was the anniversary of the great land grant in 1784, when Sir Frederick Haldimand, by an instrument under his hand and seal, declared that the Six Nations "and their posterity should be allowed to possess and enjoy a tract of land six miles in depth on each side of the Grand River; from its mouth to the Elora Falls, a distance of 100 miles?" This grant included (according to the late Herbert F. Gardiner) counting land and water, 1,200 square miles, or 768,000 acres, covering the present townships of Sherbrooke, Moulton, Dunn, Camboro, Cayuga, Seneca, Oneida, Tuscarora, Otonabee, Brantford, Dunsfries, Waterloo, Woolwich, Pilkington, and Nichol. This tract, though much smaller than that they had been obliged to forsake in the United States satisfied these loyal Indians, but it was not long before they began to do so at a sacrifice.

The deceased was of very quiet disposition and never sought after public life, but had a deep and abiding interest in his home and family life, from which he will be sadly missed.

He leaves to mourn his wife, Annie who was the youngest daughter of the late James Miller, one of the pioneer residents of Walpole Township, and two daughters, Frances and Sarah, who are both at home, together with two brothers, Wm. Wm. and George, and one sister, Mrs. Alex Jamison, all of Woodhouse.

The funeral was held on Friday last with services at the house and interment in Port Dover cemetery. The service in the house and at the grave being conducted by Rev. T. B. Details of the transaction are interesting: 94.305 acres, now constituting Dunsfries, were sold to P. Steadman for \$8,841, and were at once transferred to Hon. William Dickinson, who opened the land for settlement: 97,000 acres. The Township of Waterloo, were bought by Rev. T. B. McCormick, of Knox church, Port Dover. The pallbearers were Messrs. WRITES PRIZE ESSAY.

A. Gordon Skinner, agricultural representative at Cayuga, had the honor of winning the prize for an essay on "Soil Improvement Programs." The prize was offered by the Fertilizer Association of Eastern Canada, and entitled the winner to a trip to Washington and attendance at the annual meeting of the American Association of Agronomy. Mr. Skinner addressed the meeting at some length, the subjects elaborated on were: Classification of all risks; Rigid inspection of all risks; Mutuality and cooperation among mutual Companies. After the luncheon hour all the subjects above mentioned were fully discussed by Messrs. A. E. Smuck, Chas Bird, C. I. Fletcher, Jos. Awde and others. It was also advocated that valuations should be reduced and that the agents should attend all directors meetings. Before adjournment it was moved by A. E. Smuck and seconded by Geo. L. Miller, that all Mutual companies notify bordering companies of all rejected risks. This resolution was carried. The question of uniform policy and application was adopted unanimously.

A by-law was passed repealing by-law No. 912 authorizing the issue of debentures for \$55,000 for the Improvement of Highways.

A by-law was passed authorizing the issuing of debentures for \$45,000 to pay part of the County's proportion of expenditure for construction of Provincial Highways.

A by-law was passed authorizing the issue of debentures for \$55,000 bearing interest at 5 percent per annum for the improvement of highways.

A by-law was passed making a grant of \$1200 to the Haldimand War Memorial Hospital, payable on the 20th of December.

Report of Good Roads Committee

To the warden and members of the county council, Gentlemen:—We, your Good Roads committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. We have audited the pa lists and accounts submitted by the superintendent and recommend that they be paid.

2. The third conference of the war debris Road committees, engineers and superintendents of Welland, Lincoln, Wentworth and Haldimand was held in the court house here on Tuesday, November 4th. The attendance was twenty-five including Mr. Muir, chief engineer of the Municipal roads and Mr. MacLaines, inspecting engineer of municipal roads representing the department of public highways. There were some interesting remarks on construction of the different types of roads and maintenance, also a lengthy discussion of the high county rates and how the people were to get relief from taxation.

The fourth conference will be held in the spring of 1931 in the Court house, Welland.

At the close of the conference the visitors were taken for a drive over the new highway from Welland corners to Hagersville, and also to look over the Colprow plant.

3. The construction program for the season is completed, except a few minor details to be finished.

The following roads are receiving maintenance attention:—Nos. 4, 7, 8, 9, 11 Sc. and 12E and 18.

No claim of Mr. George Danger against the County of Haldimand. Mr. H. H. Hoyle has forwarded a letter which he received from Mr. E. Wilson & Son stating that their adjuster has inspected the road and location where accident took place and reports that Mr. Danger who made the claim against the county had absolutely no grounds for doing so, and they have written to him denying liability. They also say in their letter that if all road work was in as good condition as County road 5, they would pay very few claims.
