Who They Are and How to Get Them When Needed (Canada, Dunville)

Who is High Constable? Where do we get the provincial police? Who are they? These and a dozen other questions are asked daily in this connection, and it is the object of this article to answer them all as briefly as possible. As phone numbers are included in the article, you are advised to cut it out and place it beside your phone.

The High Constable, by a regulation recently approved, the acting High Constable in the county is Constable W. B. (Steve) Elliot and his number is 176C. His assistant is provincial constable Gordon Hayes and his number is 185Y. The third provincial officer is Traffic Officer Rawlins, phone 218Y.

These are all residential phones; and a central phone is at the Provincial Police Office, 128A. This office recently taken over, is in the Knicker-Knori building, and it is not only central, but is ideally located for a police office. An undisturbed view is afforded from the window covering the centre of the town and Chestnut street right to the C.N.R. Station. Two banks, the Bank of Toronto and the Canadian Bank of Commerce are both included in this view, and by looking a little to the left, the Royal Bank of Canada is also brought into the line of vision.

Of the activities of the Provincial Police little need be said. That they have more than justified their appointment is very evident to everyone. These constables, together with the local and county police, place Haldimand in an enviable position in so far as law enforcement is concerned.
