## Who Has Control

There is apparently considerable conjecture around the village and the surrounding countryside as to who has charge of the operations of this paper, and in order to stop the idle guessers and ordinary street gossip I desire to make matters plain enough to be easily understood. The control and editorship of this paper is in the hands of Geo. L. Miller.

The Jarvis Record Printing Company went into voluntary liquidation just about a year ago, and on the first of April this year, seeing the need of a plant of this kind, I made arrangements with Mr. Robt. Handley to take charge under an option to purchase the plant and equipment, and during the interval I have given every assistance to get it off to a good start. About two weeks ago Mr. Handley, who has other business interests in Chicago, decided to step out and I have decided to take full charge and make an effort to operate this office for the benefit of the village and community.

During the early part of this year the Board of Trade in the Village held a meeting for the purpose of discussing ways and means of getting the plant in operation. At, or subsequently, about fifty resident citizens subscribed their names to a petition guaranteeing their support and influence, and to stand behind any person who would open up and start the publication of the paper again. Since starting I have had the solid support of a part of our citizens, but a large majority seem to think that now it is started it needs no support. To those so minded I wish to remind them that unless the wholehearted support of the whole community is behind the industry it will be a hard battle to retain for you the services that the community so much needs. ## Jarvis Fall Fair Is Bigger and Better Than Ever This Year

### Large Number of Entries In All Classes: Fine Weather And Good Attendance Make Big Event a Huge Success

The seventy-seventh annual exhibition of the Jarvis Agricultural Society held on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week was well up to the standard of previous Fall Fairs held by this old and successful Society. The first day of the Fair was rather cold and dismal, but nevertheless the entries kept steadily pouring in until closing time, and when the Department Judges stepped into the hall at 1 p. m. to judge the exhibits, the hall presented a very pleasing appearance.

The number of entries in the ladies work, while not so numerous as in some years past, in point of excellence they far surpassed anything ever placed on exhibition at this fair, and the exhibitors in that department were very highly commended by the Judge for the beautiful work displayed. In the fruit and flowers the exhibits would have done credit to a much larger fair. While the roots and vegetables were not so plentiful, the quality of the exhibits were exceedingly wonderful for such a dry season, and the apples in the special prizes, as well as on plates, were a dream to gaze upon.

Yesterday, the last day of the Fair brought out a fairly large crowd, but some disappointment was felt in the number of entries in the School children's parade. The two entrants that did march and compete were surely a credit to the teachers in charge, and from the way it was conducted could not but be educative as well as instructive, the general marching and deportment of the children was extremely neat and fascinating. It should be an inducement for other schools in the district to make an effort another year to join up in this wonderful outing for the children.

The result of the Married Men's Softball Tournament was as follows: 1st, Nelles Corners, 2nd, Jarvis. 3rd was divided between Hagersville and Springvale as the time was too late to permit playing off for third money.

The horse department was well filled and hotly contested, and many remarked it was the best showing of horses at the Jarvis Fair for many years.
